"What does God require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8) These words, often quoted amongst us, have long embodied the deep and genuine calling Pullen members feel towards service within their community and beyond.

The Pullen congregation brings to life this call for social justice every single day as they open their doors and hearts to marginalized people. Pullen's recently acquired status as a sanctuary church; continued outreach efforts to support individuals who struggle to find adequate housing through the Round Table Fellowship; the lifegiving ministries with partners in Cuba, Nicaragua, The Republic of Georgia and Zimbabw; and Pullen's long-standing presence as a leader of social justice issues in our community serve only to highlight this abiding dedication to serve those in need with justice and love.

Inspired by the service Pullen members commit to our community daily, we are honored to announce the establishment of The Justice-Love Foundation. This foundation offers Pullen a unique opportunity to receive funding for social justice initiatives that matter to the congregation, deepening Pullen's position as a leader in social justice and widening the circle of support of those who give and those who receive.

The Justice-Love Foundation will be a separate entity from the church. The foundation will have a 501(c)(3)

status and will be governed by a board of directors, half of whom will be Pullen members and half of whom will be members of the larger Triangle community. We are excited that Bill Crouch, Pullen member and presi-

dent of Crouch and Associates, will be leading the board of directors and Stacy Bluth, former executive director of The Hope Center at Pullen, will serve as executive director during the initial months. Bill's experience as a former college president, successful fundraiser and non-profit consultant, and Stacy's passion and years of work with young, emerging non-profits make them ideally suited for their new roles. Additional board members to date include Barbara Goodman, Lucy Daniels and Abby Sandling.

Over the next few months the foundation will continue to build the board and operationalize its vision with the intent of awarding its first grants to support social justice projects and partnerships in early 2019. The foundation will place a strong emphasis on raising funds from individuals, businesses and organizations that have not typically given to Pullen in the past.

The Justice-Love Foundation will embody the principles that make social justice foundations impactful — we will focus on the root causes of social, economic and environmental injustices and strive to include the people who are impacted by these injustices as decision-makers. Like the Pullen community we take inspiration from, we are dedicated to committing our time, knowledge, skills and access to benefit those in the community who need it most.

As we launch this new stewardship, we seek the prayers and affirmation of Pullen. We are confident that this opportunity will allow Pullen to expand its depth and reach on the critical social justice issues it so passionately champions each and every day.


Constitution & Bylaws Revisions



Climate Church, Climate World Author Connects Faith & Environmental Activism

Monday, May 7 at 7 p.m. Author Jim Antal speaks at Pullen Memorial Baptist Church

Why should people of faith engage the moral challenge of climate change—and how should we do it? AN UPDATE FROM YOUR ASSOCIATE PASTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE:

Fellow and Sister Pullenites:

Your search committee has been tasked with the daunting challenge of filling the soon-to-be-available position of Associate Pastor at Pullen Memorial Baptist Church. We have been meeting since November and began receiving applications at the beginning of the year. We have received over 75 applications, and we have been considering every one with the thoughtful attention to which each one was entitled. Through that initial process, we reduced the number of candidates to fewer than 20, and for this smaller pool of candidates we identified four questions to which we asked each of the candidates to respond. Three of the four questions were to be submitted in writing, and the fourth was to be submitted on video. The candidates were given the privilege of choosing which of the questions would be written and which one would be on video. We received all the written and video responses, and from this list we have identified those candidates whom we want to interview in person.

We are now about the work of setting up these interviews. We will interview these candidates in April. It is our hope that from this group of applicants we will reduce the number still further until we will see emerge the individual who will be our choice to fill the position.

Even once that individual is selected, there is still much to do. That individual will meet with committees, councils and staff and the whole congregation. Everyone involved knows the importance of appropriate deliberation through it all, leading to the moment when that individual's name will be brought before the church in conference.

We thank each of you for your interest and well-wishes we have received as we have undertaken this process. Thank you for your continuing prayers as we move toward the conclusion of our work.

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Music Ministry Events to Encourage & Inspire

Transcendent Experiences: Choral Festivals & Conference

In January through March of this year, Pullen's Chancel, Youth and Children's choirs all participated in their annual festivals that take them to an historic church in Charleston, SC, a resort conference center in Myrtle Beach, SC, and to a camp in the Uhwarrie mountains near Asheboro, NC, respectively. In February, I also had the rejuvenating opportunity to participate in the Southern Division Conference of the American Choral Directors Association meeting at the Kentucky Center for the Arts and other venues in Louisville, KY. While the places that host the choral festivals and conference expanded our experience by taking us outside of our home environment, what occurred at these various locations was even more transcendent.

Transcendence took place when witnessing Pullen Chancel Choir members grow in their choral art through work with a clinician and a choir of 200; the Youth Choir exploring music and worship with 250 middle and high school singers; and our Children's Choir enjoying nature and forming a festival choir with 60 other young singers. At the festivals, Pullenites of all ages renewed old friendships and made new friends with others from our state and region. Through conversation, activities, music-making and worship, the festivals allowed us to share our own uniqueness while learning from others and connecting with them. Our lives and our awareness of the world and the human community were expanded.

I enjoyed the same kind of transcendent experience at the Louisville conference where I was privileged to connect with five choirs of youth and adults from Florida, Kentucky and Puerto Rico, who would sing my composition, "In Praise of the Village" in a concert promoting peace. I appreciated the opportunity to tell them about Pullen and my work, and to get to know their stories. It was moving to speak with singers from the University of Puerto Rico who had to overcome great financial and situational obstacles to participate. It was a joy to hear the two participating high school choirs sing with equal energy, though they came from diverse economic and cultural backgrounds. And it was inspiring to hear a Florida choir of professional adult educators and an African-American gospel choir combine with the others to provide one glorious 250-voice choir. The diverse choirs came together as part of a worldwide peace awareness project called "A Voice 4 Peace" that combines the concept of Contact Theory with choral music-making to embody and bring about peace. Celebrating Housing Stability

We are again celebrating housing

stability with our clients. In March, two more of our young people signed leases using their HOME TBRA vouchers. This voucher provides 24 months of housing assistance to a young person while the individual works to attain milestones related to job-readiness, achieving educational goals, and becoming a compliant tenant. We will continue to walk alongside each young person, providing case management support to help each individual progress in these critical areas.



A picture is worth a thousand words! This housing stability is working for our clients. Three of the recent "graduates" of HOME TBRA have moved on to obtain or are slated to obtain their Section 8 vouchers, which provide access to long-term affordable housing and another "graduate" recently obtained an apartment in income-based housing, which is a scarce resource in Wake County. We are thrilled for our clients and are thankful to our Transition

Specialists who work hard to help our young people make these strides.

Recap and Thank You: Resilience Screening

On March 13, Pullen Memorial Baptist Church graciously opened its doors for The Hope Center to host a screening of Resilience, a documentary on the correlation between Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and toxic stress.

The documentary underscores that safe, stable relationships are the pathway to building resilience. 
