orgive me for not quoting scripture or some notable historical figure, but this lyric from Christian hip-hop artist The Ambassador, is such a fitting description of my ministry journey. When I accepted a call to ministry at 17, I could not have imagined all the places it would take me, but I'm so glad I said "yes" to the ride. And I'm amazed that, after all these years, God is still taking me places!

Since my arrival, the question I've heard over and over is, "What brought you to Pullen?" I'll admit that I could not have envisioned myself at a church like Pullen from the place where I started. The first half of my ministry life was marked by a lot of legalism and very little grace. For me, keeping the rules kept me and others in God's good graces; breaking the rules invited God's punishment. The message of my ministry was clear: resist worldly influences and keep "God's" rules. However, a few years out of seminary, I noticed that my belief system didn't always hold up against the complexities of the human experience. Actually, it's not so much that I had not noticed this before, but it was the first time I gave myself space to really consider it. Instead of employing my usual apologetic gymnastics, I began to allow myself to explore and give voice to what I truly believed. Over time, I embraced a much more robust economy of grace, and as I engaged God out of love rather than fear, the relationship that emerged was authentic and deep. This was the kind of relationship I wanted others to experience! This was the kind of relationship that had the power to transform individuals and communities!

This revelation changed my priorities, my preaching, pastoral care, and the entire trajectory of my ministry. I knew that I wanted to inhabit faith communities of radical welcome where people were encouraged to be honest about who they were and what they believed. I wasn't even sure this kind of community existed, so imagine how elated I

was to find Pullen right in my backyard!

I'm grateful for the warm welcome I have received from this community in the form of hugs, notes, and those who have stopped by the office to introduce themselves. I've spent my first few weeks getting to know the staff, connecting with some of our young adults through Theology on Tap and preparing for our Wednesday Night programs in the fall. I look forward to continued engagement with Pullen's elders, helping to foster intergenerational interaction within the congregation, and walking alongside those who are new to the Pullen community.

While that might cover my job description, I hope that

God's plan for me as a Pullenite extends far beyond what is written. I think that's what the scripture means when it says that, through us, God "is able accomplish abundantly more than all we can ask or imagine (Eph. 3:20)." Pullen, thank you for inviting me to ride with you! May the journey take us far bevond anything we could have anticipated!

Service at Pullen: Acts of Hospitality, Giving, Worship

Round Table is Growing: Volunteers Needed

If you are not in Finlator Hall on Tuesdays or Thursdays from noon onwards, then you are most likely not aware of Pullen's effort to alleviate the burden faced by many people with housing instability and food insecurity. So far in 2018, we have served over 2,500 meals, provided over 2,000 snack packs, and assisted with \$2,000 towards rents and utilities. Beyond these numerical expressions, volunteers spend their time and energies learning names and listening to stories, hoping they can provide a few moments of friendship and hope to people in distress.

Round Table not only provides hospitality, but also provides services from local providers and organizations specializing in homelessness. Currently, we have social workers from Haven



House, a nonprofit committed to young people experiencing homelessness and crises situations, visiting every Tuesday. WakeMed's PATH program sends social workers specialized in assisting chronically homeless people with severe mental illness. In addition, social workers drop by from South Light, the Wilmington Street Center, Catholic Parish Outreach, and Church in the Woods.

Also as the numbers indicate, Round Table is growing, and to meet the continued needs in our community, we have partnered with several new food donors. Round Table receives donations from Starbucks locations in Cameron Park, on Peace Street, and at Lake Boone Trail. Chick-fil-A in Cameron Village offers donations twice every week. St. Mary's School provides fresh produce from the garden, volunteers shop at the Food Bank of Central and Eastern North Carolina, and countless people in the church and community regularly drop off donations for lunch and snack packs.

Our newest partner is Interfaith Food Shuttle. After a multi-month process of inspections and reorganizing (thank you Warren Chesson and the Handy Corps!), Round Table is an official partner receiving accolades for organization, cleanliness, and mission. We will receive protein and produce, two of our most sought after items.

With all of this growth, we need volunteers. The Pullen Round table Fellowship is an excellent opportunity to provide our radical hospitality to people experiencing housing instability and food insecurity. Round Table occurs twice a week on Tuesday and Thursday. Volunteers help prepare and serve meals and, in the process, form appropriate relationships with the people in our community. We have volunteers from Pullen Memorial Baptist Church, Hayes Barton United Methodist Church, North Carolina State University, and St. Francis Parish. Come join us in a fun, enriching experience! Progress Report on Building Repairs

We hope you have noticed the fresh paint, the newly installed windows and the cleaning of the brick on our 1950s-era building (sanctuary). While there are a couple of bricks still needing repair, this phase is 99% complete. It looks really good! We've moved on to Phase 2 (east side of the 1920s building) which is the hardest and longest phase of our exterior repair project. The mortar repointing is in full swing and is very labor intensive. The workers are dodging the summer storms as much as possible. Thank you for enduring the dust!

One advantage of having the scaffolding in place is that we've been able to inspect areas that have been nearly impossible to inspect before, at least not safely. For example, our roofing contractor discovered that the guttering on the east tower is in bad shape. Though this expense was unanticipated, we feel the urgency to repair this section of gutter in order to take advantage of the scaffolding. This repair will add about \$11,000 to our project.

To date, the following PUR (Pullen Urgent Repair) funds have been spent:

- 1) Replacement of sanctuary air conditioner (\$55,000)
- 2) Upgrades to the children's classrooms (\$42,586)
- 3) Continued work on gutter repair (\$20,524)
- 4) Replacement of roof safety anchors (\$30,450)
- 5) Mortar repointing & other exterior repairs (\$154,181) Total PUR funds spent to date: **\$302,741**

Volunteer tutors meet with a young person weekly to provide extra support in individual subject areas, either at the foster home or another location near the foster home. Tutors have a lasting impact on a young person's life—they are not just a source of academic support, but also become another trusted adult in a young person's life.
