

Foyers Return

We're excited to announce that we are restarting Foyers at Pullen after being on hiatus since the beginning of the pandemic! Foyer is a French word that means "hearth" or "fireside," suggesting a group that is relaxed, receptive, and open to each other. At Pullen, Foyers are small gatherings of people around a simple meal. There is only so much we can learn about someone in passing after a worship service or at a church meeting, but sharing a meal together allows us to go deeper. Over and over, we have heard people say that participating in Foyers made them feel more connected in our community and provided opportunities to develop organic relationships of care and mutual support.

Who can join a Foyer?

- Members and non-members
- People who are new to this community and those who have been around for a while
- Single people, partnered people, families with or without children

How do Foyers work?

- We will assign people to groups consisting of 6-8 individuals representing 3-5 family units.
- The group commits to meeting once in each household over the next year.
- The host prepares (or provides) a simple meal.

Beyond Executions: Remembering 43 Lost and Creating a Future without Death Row: August 19 at 12:00 pm at Pullen

Please join us in Raleigh on Saturday, August 19th, from noon to 2:00 pm when we will mark 17 years since the last execution in our state and tell Governor Cooper "No More Death Row"! We will begin at Pullen Memorial Baptist Church inside at noon where we will read the names of the 43 people executed in North Carolina since 1984. Nick Courmon will also debut a new spoken word piece entitled "Cradle to Gurney". For those who would like to, we will then march less than a mile to Central Prison where we will hold vigil for about 15 minutes. There will be

Race and Housing Dialogue: September 19 at 7:00 pm at Cary First Christian Church

On Tuesday, September 19th from 7– 8:30 pm, Cary First Christian Church, Crosspointe Church, and Transformation Fellowship Christian Church are hosting a Race & Housing Dialogue at Cary First Christian (1109 Evans Rd, Cary). We will watch *Segregated By Design*, a 17-minute documentary based on the book <u>The Color of Law</u>. This documentary (click <u>here</u> to watch the trailer) examines the often-forgotten history of how our federal, state, and local governments unconstitutionally segregated every metropolitan area in America through law and policy and the lasting impact it has today. We will watch the film together, and then break out in smaller groups to discuss. We will end by talking about how to advocate for changed policies. Please join us for this important conversation. We are intentionally inviting Black and white congregations to participate because our experience has been that this leads to the most compelling dialogue. July Hope Center Update

The last month has brought some great opportunities to the youth and young adults in our programs:

- Members of our staff and Youth Advisory Board joined First Lady Kristin Cooper at the Executive Mansion to discuss challenges within the foster care system. We are so fortunate that the First Lady is an advocate for current and former foster youth!
- One of the young women in our programs was a surprise recipient of the Gilbert Scholarship Inc's 50th scholarship of \$1,500 to help with college costs. This scholarship fund was created solely for the purpose of helping foster youth attain a post-secondary education.
- Truist Bank staff volunteered their time and expertise to teach our foster teens about all the financial responsibilities that come with adulthood. After a passionate presentation from Truist, each teen received a unique fictional scenario including marital status, monthly household income, number of children, and credit score. Then they visited each educational station addressing things like auto, budgeting, housing, retail, and childcare to essentially balance out their monthly budget.

Our Teen and Transition program specialists are currently going through training to become official life coaches. This new training will certify them in this area and improve upon the practices we already have in place to help foster youth.

We are moving forward in the process of our partnership with CASA to build a new apartment complex with 9 1-bedroom units specifically for our clients! Housing is an ingoing challenge, and this

opportunity is truly a blessing. We are still very early in the process, but our Youth Advisory Board will soon be meeting with staff from The Hope Center and an advertising team to help select the best name for this property. We are very excited to see this come to fruition, even if it's in small bits. Are you interested in helping our youth?
