Does January always go by so quickly? Time, I find, is a mysterious thing. Some weeks go by so fast that it seems I hardly finish writing one sermon before it is time to deliver the next one. Other weeks, like last week, I wake up and say to Karla: "Is it only Tuesday?" Just yesterday it seemed like I had weeks upon weeks to make preparations for February. But on this morning of February 2, as I write this article, I find myself quoting Dr. Seuss: "How did it get so late so soon?"

There is a lot going on in the life of our Pullen community in February. For this article, I want to hit the highlights of what will be happening at Pullen this month. But know that behind the curtain there are many councils and committees meeting and doing the "work" of the church every single day. We often don't see the labor of love that makes families and communities function day-in-and-day-out, but trust me, that labor of love is happening every day at Pullen.

February 6: Feed the Pack and Urban Ministries Offering:

I'll start with this Sunday, **February 6**. This Sunday, we are collecting food for both *Feed the Pack* food pantry and for *Urban Ministries*. Some of you might remember the Sunday we collected food for *Feed the Pack* pantry back before the pandemic. Our goal had been to fill the chancel steps with food. If you have any memory of that Sunday, you will remember that our entire chancel area was filled with food. Your generosity overflowed that Sunday morning. It is a picture that will forever be imprinted in my mind's eye and on my heart. Now it's time for us to once again help restock the *Feed the Pack* food pantry and *Urban Ministries* food pantry.

In 2020, 14% of Wake County's population qualified as food insecure. 18% of Wake County children lived in food-insecure homes. Only 14% of eligible children

Anne Petters, who died on January 15 at her home. Anne joined Pullen in September 1976 with her four sons, and quickly became a member of the Pullen choir where she offered her musical gifts. Her service was held at Pullen on January 29.

Don Duel, who died on Monday, January 17. Don joined Pullen in April 2007. He was deeply committed to our partnerships in Cuba and Nicaragua, and will be remembered for his generosity, his curiosity about life and faith, and his gentle and welcoming spirit. received free summer meals. The numbers are not out for 2021 but food insecurity was expected to increase by 38% in 2021 due to the pandemic. If I had to guess, all of these numbers are lower today.

As you enter the sanctuary for worship this Sunday place your food offerings on the chancel steps. If you are not planning to attend in-person worship this Sunday, you are invited to bring your food to the church anytime this week between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Also, on **Saturday (Feb. 5)** between 10:00 a.m. and noon someone will be at the front door of the church to let you in and/or help you with your offering.

February 20 Congregational Meeting:

On Sunday, February 20, we will gather immediately after worship in the sanctuary for our constitutionally required congregational meeting to finalize our 2022 budget. 



Feb. 2 - Human Health & Environmental Justice

The NCSU Center for Human Health and the Environment is asking congregations like ours to contribute their time to improve our understanding of the effects of environmental contaminants such as metals and Per- and Polyfluorinated Substances (PFAS) on our health. These contaminants are found in greater concentrations in ethnic minorities and data generated will inform policy and help us design early detection tests to prevent severe disease for all ethnic groups. Dr. Hoyo will explore participation in this study, and the information that the study is anticipated to contribute to address the issue of environmental injustice.

Dr. Hoyo is a Distinguished Professor of Biological Sciences and the Director of the Epidemiology and Environmental Epigenetics Laboratory at NC State University. She leads the Southern Liver Health Study (STRIVE), a collaborative effort among NC State, Duke, UNC Chapel Hill and Emory in Georgia.



Feb. 9 - Perceived Realities, Virtual Exhibit, and Conversation

Photographer John Kolkin will walk us through his series aimed at giving voice to the rise of intolerance. He looks at billboards on thoroughfares across the country, and the ways they sometimes propagate divisive rhetoric intended to delegitimize and demonize those with alternative theological perspectives,

Jon Kolkin is an internationally recognized artist whose projects tend to incorporate underlying themes related to personal growth and often serve as a springboard for conversation.



Feb. 16 - Earth Care as Self Care

Often when we look at the intersection of creation care and racial justice, we talk about how contaminants and environmental devastation disproportionately impact communities of color. Tonight we'll look at the ways in which connection to the land brings much-needed healing through the eyes of Amber Burgin-Brothers and Monique Williams, two Black women cultivating the land to help build up their community. Amber Burgin-Brothers is a native of the Triangle area. She is a proud graduate of North Carolina Central University, receiving her B.A and M.A., in Psychology. She is also a recent graduate of Duke Divinity School. Amber is the founder of Elijah's Farm, located in Rougemont NC-an ADA-friendly farm, specializing in mushrooms, small-scale produce, and cut flowers. Additionally, Amber serves as a Minister at Union Baptist Church

in Durham North Carolina, and as a Student Support and Resource Manager at The Emily K Center.

Rev. Dr. Monique Williams is a native Houstonian and lover of God, family, and nature. She earned her degrees in Business, Theology, and Community Resiliency from Howard University, Duke University, and Creighton University, respectively. In Spring 2021, Dr. Williams began The Heir+Loom Foundation, an organization that promotes care of self and the love of God through nature. Apart from fostering a community of like-minded young black nature lovers, Dr. Williams seeks to resource her 100-year-old family land in Somerville, TX for the purpose of enriching communities of color through access to agricultural experiences for emotional, mental and spiritual healing and community impact.



Feb. 23 - A Look at the Housing Crisis in Raleigh

In a recent release from Zillow, Raleigh was ranked the 3rd "Hottest Housing Market" in the country. No doubt this will send more people flocking to the area, but what does it mean for moderate and low-income residents who have called Raleigh home for years? Median rents in Raleigh have increased by 21.1% since the start of the pandemic alone. We'll hear from advocate and impacted resident, Wanda Hunter, of the Wake County Housing Justice Coalition, and ONE Wake organizer Stephon Whitley.

Getting to Know Our Afghan Guests and Finding Ways to Help

In mid-January, we at Pullen were blessed with the arrival of three recent refugees from Afghanistan —a married man and woman and their baby boy. The family is now staying in Pullen's guest space while they seek employment and more permanent housing. Pullen's Resettlement Mission Group is organizing volunteers as we offer support to this family now and in the year ahead.

In the short time, we've had with the family, we have come to respect their strength and courage, and it has been a delight getting to know them. (To protect their privacy and safety, here we will refer to the man as "D." and the woman as "A.") In Afghanistan, before the crisis last summer, D. and A. were leading a full life. D. is a 31-year-old lawyer who lectured at a university, and A., 29, taught physics at a high school. When they suddenly were forced to flee their home country under extremely dangerous circumstances, they were expecting their first child. The baby, now four months old, was born when they were in a camp in Virginia.

The family came to us through our partner, Lutheran Services Carolinas: Triangle Refugee Action Council. That group is providing some limited ongoing services for the family, and they will pay for the first six months of rent when the family finds an affordable place to live—a significant challenge in our area. We would appreciate any leads on an affordable house or apartment.

How else can you help? We have lots of opportunities:

Volunteer to help provide transportation for the family or conduct an evening security check in the church. (A check must be completed every evening to ensure the family's safety—we can walk you through the process.)

Donate baby supplies for a four-month-old. One immediate need is a bouncy seat suitable for an infant.

Donate gift cards for Harris Teeter, Walgreens or Target—all are within walking distance for the family.

Donate your time by showing our guests around town or schedule a visit for tea and conversation.

They came to us with fairly strong English skills, and welcome opportunities to practice.
