January 15 - "In So Many Words" Film Screening, and Q&A with Lucy Daniels

This remarkable documentary explores the inner life of Dr. Lucy Daniels, whose childhood has both tormented and motivated her throughout her life. Filmmaker Elisabeth Haviland James employs imagined narrative, constructed dream sequences, intimate interviews, and Daniels's own writing to bring a harrowing survival story to the screen. We will begin the screening at 6 pm, and conclude before 7:30 pm, providing those who need to leave the opportunity to do so. The movie will be followed by a Q&A with Lucy Daniels for those who are able to stay. This free event, which includes dinner, is sponsored by the Justice Love Foundation.

January 22 - Writing as Teacher and Healer

Facing a blank page often triggers anxiety and resistance. Working through this resistance can become a spiritual practice and path toward growth and healing. Referring to Dr. Lucy Daniel's documentary, *In So Many Words*, and her own therapy with Dr. Daniels, Mary Lambeth Moore will discuss writing as teacher, recognizing resistance (which often comes disguised), and ways to develop a consistent writing practice. Attendees will be invited to share their

experiences and do a bit of impromptu writing.

We'll explore the mind, body, spirit connection
using the practice of Tai Chi, led by Ryan
McCann of TW Smith's Martial Arts Center.

On February 5 our friends at St. Ambrose Episcopal Church have invited us to their table! As a part of their Black History Month Celebration, St. Ambrose is hosting an Ethopian meal and special evensong. Dinner begins at 6 pm with a catered meal designed to offer a sampling of Ethiopian cuisine. From there, St. Ambrose rector, Jemonde Taylor, will present on Ethiopian culture and Christian tradition using the artifacts and stories he has collected in his travels and studies. As an uncolonized nation on the African continent, the history of Christianity in Ethiopia is unique, and I hope we will take advantage of the opportunity to learn from Fr. Taylor's expertise.

This will be an event for the entire family with art activities for children and a drumming session for youth. All ages will gather in the sanctuary from 7:00-7:30 pm for an evensong service in the Ethiopian tradition.

St. Ambrose Episcopal Church is a historically black congregation with more than 150 years serving the Raleigh community. While the Sunday morning worship hour still remains one of the most segregated, it is important to create space, where we can, to break bread and worship across racial and cultural lines. I know we're used to our routine, and meeting at a different location requires a little extra effort, but drawing the circle wider will always require us to shift a bit. I hope that you will join us at St. Ambrose Episcopal Church on Wednesday, February 5!

Sanctuary and Resettlement Update



Two Years after Our Sanctuary Vote, What is Now in Store for Pullen?

In January 2018, our church voted to become a Sanctuary church with great volunteer momentum to support a Sanctuary guest. Members of Pullen and the Raleigh Mennonite Church formed a mission group charged with supporting a Sanctuary guest for an extended period of time. Hard work was done to outfit living quarters near the youth rooms for a sanctuary guest. We were at the ready, but then applications for Sanctuary dried up. Time went by.

With the two churches' support, the Resettlement and Sanctuary Mission Group switched tactics, moving our work from Sanctuary toward supporting

an immigrant sent from the southern border in need of asylum. Yet, despite hours of contacts, written applications, and interviews, no organization is yet willing to send an immigrant with a viable case here, because the overwhelming majority of asylum cases heard in NC are denied.

Only one door is still open to us for a long term guest at this time, and that is to an organization called the Santa Fe Dreamers' Project. This group assists transgender females from the southern border currently living in detention in New Mexico. We believe that our church is uniquely situated, because of its strong LGBTQ community, to support a transgender person as their case is being heard.

A recommendation would be based on whether placing someone with us would be in that person's best interest, and also that person's desire to come here and live in a church environment for a few months. The living quarters at Pullen remain open as we wait to hear from the Dreamers' Project. Our volunteer base still exists and can be mobilized.

In the meantime, to help our mission work evolve further, we are asking for guidance from the local immigrant advocacy community to identify not only the most pressing needs, but needs that we feel equipped to address. We need to know more about what advice is being given to local immigrants seeking status.

We believe that we should plug into already established local service projects run by more experienced people who speak Spanish (or any other language required). We are now receiving requests from the immigrant community to provide short-term basic need support, such as transportation costs, food and clothing. We have provided short-term support to several immigrants, and we are open to providing emergency shelter to immigrants in crisis, as we did last July.

With all the changes over the past two years, we continue to work on a mission statement that truly reflects our purpose. We look forward to sharing this statement with you in the near future, and welcome anyone who wants to participate in the work ahead. We meet every 3rd Tuesday at 5 pm at Pullen. Emergency Assistance Collaboration

For years, several downtown congregations have helped various people needing financial assistance for rent, utilities, and food. Often supplying money requires communication amongst the churches to cobble together the needed funds. This takes time, and individuals needing assistance miss work, lose income, and become frustrated. When the assistance is finally given, there is no planned assessing the efficacy of the assistance.

Understanding this is an untenable way to work, Pullen, First Presbyterian, First Baptist, and Edenton Street United Methodist began thinking of ways we could work more effectively and collaboratively. The goal was simply to make ascertaining much-needed assistance less frustrating. After a few meetings, we invited Lorena McDowell

from Wake County's Department of Housing Affordability and Community Revitalization and Kathy Johnson from Oak City Cares to join the conversation. The aim was to eliminate barriers to assistance and screen for households needing more sustainable solutions. The budding partnerships of downtown churches transformed into a collaboration between faith communities and Wake County Human Services. The four churches agreed to combine resources and focus emergency assistance on people who truly need a one-time intervention, while households needing more assistance to become sustainable would be handled by Wake County's newly-formed Homelessness Prevention Team.



FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

This collaboration, which has already begun, will operate in the central location of First
Presbyterian with staff and volunteers utilizing a simple intake tool created by Wake County. If the household requires further prevention, then the volunteers will be able to do coordinated entry and offer a soft handoff to the Prevention Team. More in-depth help could include multiple months of assistance, job and housing coaching, and social service casework. Those requiring a one-time financial assistance will be helped by the combined \$300,000 from the downtown churches.

Earth Ministry Challenge

I have been reading an eye-opening, and frightening book: On Fire: The (Burning) Case for a Green New Deal, by Naomi Klein. This book ties together many of todays issues for me, and I encourage you to read it. The award winning journalist, writer, and Rutgers professor writes:

"Until the 1600's, earth was seen as alive, usually taking the form of a mother. Europeans, like indigenous people the world over, believed the planet to be a living organism, full of life-giving powers, but also wrathful tempers. There were, for this reason, strong taboos against actions that would deform or desecrate "the mother," including mining. This metaphor changed with the unlocking of some (but by no means all) of nature's mysteries during the scientific revolution of the 1600's. With nature now cast as a machine, devoid of mystery or divinity, its component parts could be dammed, extracted, and remade with impunity. Nature still sometimes appeared as a woman, but one easily dominated and subdued."

Klein writes that Edward Said was "a giant in the study of "othering," what is described in his 1978 book <u>Orientalism</u> as "disregarding, essentializing, denuding the humanity of another culture, people or geographical region." And once the other has been firmly established, the ground is softened for any transgression: violent expulsion, land theft, occupation, invasion because the whole point of othering is that the other doesn't have the same rights, the same humanity, as those making the distinction.

What does this have to do with climate change? Perhaps everything. We have dangerously warmed our world already, and our governments still refuse to take the actions necessary to halt the trend. This refusal to lower emissions has been accompanied with full awareness of the dangers. And this kind of recklessness would have been functionally impossible without institutional racism, even if only latent. It would have been impossible without Orientalism, without all the potent tools that allow the powerful to discount the lives of the less powerful. These tools- of ranking the relative value of humans- are what allow the writing off of entire nations and ancient cultures. And they are what allowed for the digging up of all that carbon to begin with.

If you have heard or read any news in the past weeks, you may have some sense of the urgency of climate change, that we may have less than 8 years to make drastic changes to prevent catastrophe. Pullen church has fought for years against societal wrongs: racism, sexism, gender inequality, poverty, war. Now is the time to open our eyes to climate change, and as Ms. Klein writes, "A culture that places so little value on black and brown lives that it is willing to let human beings disappear beneath the waves, or set themselves on fire in detention centers, will also be willing to let the countries where black and brown people live disappear beneath the waves, or desiccate in the arid heat." Now is the time to act.
