The Seekers of Wisdom

Episcopal priest and wisdom teacher, Cynthia Bourgeault recently posted this message to her students. She writes:

Hold fast the hope, friends. Despite everything being broadcast to us announcing a season of grim death and impending planetary lockdown, I simply cannot bring myself to believe that this is the case. Somehow - (why do I intuit this so stubbornly?) - a corner has been guietly turned, and this omicron wave is not what we are making it out to be, not the consummation of the reign of terror but the beginning of the healing. I do not know how, but I sense so strongly "yes." It was the unexpected but pervasive presence of Mary at [a recent] retreat that more than anything else delivered this assurance to my heart, together with its quietly shimmering emotional touchstones: gentleness, tenderness, beauty. Drink deeply of this draught, friends, and remain steady in your post. Let us bear this gift of the Magi - the seekers of Wisdom - to our terrified planet in this, the dark night of our collective human spirit. Our cry has been heard.

Since reading her post, I have held on to her words as words of hope. I don't know if she is right or wrong. That doesn't seem to me to be the point. What I hear in this wisdom teacher's writing is that we are a people who are called to hold out hope in the darkest of times. Not a fake or false hope, but a kind of hope that rises out of the darkest times. A hope that relies on us to "remain steady in our post." Her affirmation that our cries have been heard echo the voices of our spiritual ancestors: "In my distress, I called upon the Lord; to my God, I cried for help. God heard my voice, and my cry reached God's ears." (Psalm 18:6) And she reminds us that our willingness to hear a "yes" today is rooted in the courage of Mary's "yes" to the angel who announced the news that she would bear/birth hope and love into the world.

The wisdom I hear is not a dismissal of the reality that people are sick with COVID or a variant of COVID, but rather I hear that the naming of our hope, our yes, and

our willingness to cry out on behalf of humanity is what ultimately leads to our healing. And that these are the gifts that we can bring to the world today to make sure that Love is still being born.

This message resonates with me as I think about our church heading into a new year. It will be *our hope* for a more justice-loving world, *our courageous "yes"* to be midwives, and *our cries* for a hurting humanity and planet that will birth Love – the Christ child – into our world today. This is what it means to engage the work of Christmas not just on one day of the year but on every day of the year. So, as the New Year begins, let us be a Christmas people – the seekers of wisdom – every day of the year remaining at our post to be hope, to say "yes" and to cry out for the healing of our world.

January 5 - Card-making



Focus on Pullen's Kids

Pullen is a church that welcomes everyone, and Children's Worship is an important element integrating our children into worship at Pullen. Children's Worship at Pullen is based on a philosophy

and structure of worship that is sometimes called "Godly Play" and was popularized in the book entitled Young Children and Worship by Jerome Berryman and Sonja Stewart. This book is available in the church library and describes in detail this experiential worship style for young children. The approach of Children's Worship is designed to

- · allow children to engage in Bible stories and consider their possible meanings;
- nurture the behaviors, disciplines, skills, and orders of simple worship services, and to
- be developmentally appropriate allowing for physical and creative reactions to each story.

Each Sunday, all kindergarteners, first graders, and second graders begin their worship experience in the sanctuary with you where they can practice the skills they are nurturing in Children's Worship. A short time into the congregational worship service, the congregation sings a blessing to the children as they "follow the light" out of the sanctuary. They then follow the Worship Greeter and the light to Room 112 where their worship is held.

All kindergarten, first, and second-grade students are invited to participate in Children's Worship, AND we need others to help to make this experience possible. Right now, we are in need of Worship Leaders. We have a cloud of greats whom you can call upon to learn of the joys they've experienced over the years leading in Children's Worship (Serena Buckner, Grace Evans, Vanessa Jeter, and Libby Stephens just to name a few). Right now, we are looking for NEW leaders to be trained to facilitate in our Children's Worship. Parents, as well as other volunteers, are needed to serve each Sunday as Children's Worship Greeters.



Around the Community

Reforming the Monetary Bail Bond Process in North Carolina

This is the first in a series of public discussions on how to reform the monetary bail bond process in North Carolina.

Community United Church of Christ and Umstead Park United Church of Christ are honored to host Dr. Samantha Zottola to discuss her research and conclusions regarding Pretrial Assessment Tools. Her presentation will include:

An overview of monetary bail bonding nationally

Discussion of the pretrial decision-making processes

Review of pretrial assessment instruments

Summary of research on pretrial assessment instruments

The use of monetary Bail Bonding for pretrial defendant release is one of the most unjust and racially discriminatory aspects of the criminal justice system.

Seventy percent or more of local jail populations are people held in pretrial detention. Most are charged with nonviolent crimes, and most are held because they do not have the funds to pay their bail. This pretrial jail time can last for weeks or months and cause severe financial, family and emotional hardship. Consequently, there is widespread agreement that bail reform is needed; however, what this entails is highly contested.

One important aspect of bail reform focuses on the decision-making process by which bail amounts are set. Bail is often set during one to five minute hearings, and as a result, bail decisions are often subjective and influenced by stereotypes or other mental shortcuts. Incorporating assessment instruments into this process, the topic of Dr. Zottola's talk, can help provide needed structure, transparency, and accountability to pretrial decisions.

It is our hope that you will leave with a better understanding of the pretrial assessment process and why we are committed to reform and replacement of the monetary bail bonding system.
