A Gift from Phil

BEQUEST OF PHIL LETSINGER

Phil and Judy Letsinger were long time, involved members of Pullen Memorial Baptist Church. Judy died on October 1, 2006: and Phil died on October 24, 2017, leaving a generous, unrestricted bequest to Pullen. The church has received the primary distribution from his estate of approximately \$600,000. A smaller final distribution is expected later this vear.

The Gifts, Endowments, Memorials, and Scholarships Committee (GEMS) is charged with the responsibility and opportunity of managing this bequest. GEMS has solicited input from the Pullen staff, the Finance Committee, and those who knew Phil well for ideas for use of this unrestricted bequest. Now GEMS has decided on a wide range of uses. Many of the allocations will honor particular interests of Phil and how he was involved at Pullen.

Phil was on the Buildings and Grounds Committee for many years and was chair for several years, volunteered with the Handy Corps, and was a professional architect. He well knew the needs of the church and its building, for which there was usually inadequate annual funding. Therefore, GEMS decided to allocate \$100,000 for the Pullen Urgent Repairs account and \$200,000 for a Buildings and Grounds reserve fund.

You will want to be sure to attend the June 6 Raising Hope Dinner and Silent Auction fundraiser for the Hope Center at Pullen. Four of Phil Letsinger's original water colors, as well as one of his silk screen prints, will be included in the Silent Auction. Two quilted pieces that were part of the Letsinger Estate will also be available at the auction.

Phil was also very involved with the missions and outreach partners of our church and made many international and national trips to further our relationships with those partners. GEMS has allocated a total of \$100,000 to the following partners: the Community of the Cross of Nails in Coventry, England to start an endowment to sponsor a yearly intern; AMOS in Nicaragua; Peace Cathedral in the Republic of Georgia with some funding for Georgia visitors to Pullen for the 30th anniversary of our partnership; First Baptist Church of Matanzas, Cuba and the Kairos Center there; and the Housing Development Alliance in Hazard, Kentucky. Phil served for many years with the Sanctuary Visual Imagery Group and was a collector of art.

GEMS has allocated \$5,000 for a speaker series focusing on the visual arts and religion. Other allocations from this bequest will be for justice issues important to our church in the total amount of \$61,800. They will include a racial equity project and a non-whitewashed tour of Washington, DC. You will be hearing more about these initiatives later.

Finally, GEMS has allocated the total amount of \$89,000 for church group travel, building security upgrades, music ministry (piano repair, another piano for the chapel, choir rehearsal room TV monitor), a safer and better coffee and drink system, and enhancing staff mental and emotional wellness.

These allocations come to a total of \$555.800. GEMS did not feel it was necessary to allocate the entire bequest immediately. There is approximately \$44,200 remaining, plus the final estate distribution, which GEMS will allocate later, based on church needs and additional input from staff and others.



Housing Needs in Wake County

The South Wilmington Street Center is an emergency and transitional shelter in Raleigh that serves men experiencing homelessness in Wake County. The Center is now offering a Rapid Re-housing program to assist eligible guests in moving as quickly as possible into permanent housing and achieving housing stability through a combination of rental assistance and supportive services. The Center is seeking partnerships with landlords who are willing to work with us to help our guests secure housing, ending their homelessness. Emmaus House Opportunity

Emmaus House was a mission group formed by Pullen members Paul Carr, Larry Highfill, and Jim Hutchby in 1984 to provide safe, affordable housing for working, homeless men recovering from substance dependency. It is now a nonprofit that includes three large houses and a triplex apartment unit serving 33 residents, with a contract to add a quadraplex and serve 8 more residents. To raise funds for Emmaus House's programs, the Stewards Fund has offered to match new donations up to \$30,400 made by June 30, 2019. Interfaith Network of Care for People Experiencing Homelessness

For years, Pullen has been dedicated to working with people experiencing homelessness. Our work has taken us in myriad directions, including providing food, utilities assistance, travel assistance, peer support, and advocacy. After much discernment, a Pullen task force is looking to gather faith communities from the Triangle for an Interfaith Network of Care for People Experiencing Homelessness. Our dream is that the faith communities of Wake County would work together to advocate, educate, and provide resources for people experiencing homelessness. We see this work manifesting itself in multi-level advocacy work, educational events inside and outside of congregations, and a better understanding and compilation of resources communities of faith provide people experiencing homelessness and food insecurity.




Bridge of Hope Individual Award Winner:

Pullen Mission Women are sponsoring a book drive to benefit the students of Southeast Elementary, a new neighborhood school opening this fall. The students, ranging in age from 3 to 9, are mostly Hispanic and African-American. Many come from homes where there

are few, if any, books. The books we collect will be given to the students to keep as their very own.

Southeast Elementary will operate in conjunction with the new YMCA next door in southeast Raleigh. Swimming lessons will be a part of the school curriculum. There will be no bussing for racial balance. It will be a school serving the needs of the local neighborhood, directing educational resources tailor made to meet the specific needs of those students.

New or like-new children's books that feature Hispanic, African-American or multiracial characters would be especially prized. Children's books in Spanish, or in Spanish and English, are also desired. So far, Quail Ridge Books has proved a good source. The book drive will run from May through August. It is cosponsored by Church Women United, of which we are a member congregation.
