another reason. Since Sunday, I have received a number of emails thanking me for displaying the Ukrainian flag on our communion table this past Sunday. As I thought through that decision, I had mixed emotions. I didn't want in any way to dampen our celebration or shift the focus away from the extraordinary and significant decision Pullen made 30 years ago. I struggled. I want to share with you two emails that I received after Sunday's worship.

"Looking to the present and future, the Church went to the trouble to place the Ukrainian flag on the altar. I was impressed and heartened that you did this. It would have been so much easier to mention Ukraine and go on with the service but you took this extra step. Praise be to God, praise be to Pullen to use Church language. Thank you."

"Celebrating the 30th anniversary of Pullen's becoming a welcoming and affirming congregation and blessing same-gender unions is/was important. But we live in the present. Putting the Ukraine flag on the altar was hugely important to me. Visually the flag was front and center. Using the flag as an altar cloth was itself a kind of prayer – in many ways more powerful than a spoken prayer because the flag formed a backdrop to the service."

I am deeply grateful that Pullen is a church that can hold together gratitude and grief. We can celebrate one decision and have deep concern for another all in the same worship experience. To use church language, we can offer our praise and our lament to the same God and trust that God can hold both. Thank you, Pullen, for holding that kind of space in the world. More than ever, and in these times, we need such spaces where our blessings and our burdens can be held in the promise of God's hope. You, Pullen people, are such a space and place. And for that, my heart is holding a large amount of gratitude.


March at The Table




Art Series (In-Person)

Mysticism & More (Virtual)

March 16 - The Great Debate: Shamrock vs. Hamantaschen In the year 2022, on March 17, known in the Hebrew calendar as 14, Adar II, 5782 the great religious holidays of St. Patrick's Day





and Purim coincide. Both holidays are marked by merriment and outlandish fun-making. In preparation and pursuit of such merriment, the Baptists of Pullen and Jews of Temple Beth Or will witness an eccentric debate between the right Reverend Dr. Nancy Petty, and the revered Rabbi Lucy H.F. Dinner. Bring your favorite drinking stein or Kiddush Cup filled with your beverage of choice. Have your noise makers ready for the reading of the Holy Scriptures. Wear your St. Patty's Day hats or scarfs or Your Purim Masks. Which is better: the shamrock or hamantaschen? March 23 - Wading into Mysticism

March 30 - A Psychic's Perspective

This week we'll hear from Susan Reintjes, the psychic featured in the NY Times bestselling book Proof Of Heaven by Eben Alexander, MD. She was commissioned by Oprah Winfrey as a psychic consultant and has helped thousands of clients clear illnesses and resolve relationship dilemmas through past life regression. A certified parapsychologist, Susan has led paranormal investigations. She has been a practicing psychic, Jungian psychotherapist for 40 years and is a five-time author.

April 6 - Mysticism and Faith

Rachael Wooten and Chalice Overy talk about mysticism as it relates to their faith—how they stumbled upon mysticism in the faith journey and how it has sustained it. In addition to being a Pullen member, Rachael Wooten is a Zürich-trained Jungian analyst and psychologist who has been in private practice as a therapist for more than forty years. As a child, Rachael was drawn to different religious expressions and followed her instincts to study and practice in different traditions. Her interests in human consciousness led her to the field of psychology. Given its limitations for encompassing the whole of the individual, she began Jungian studies and a deep dive into spiritual practices for her own healing, that of her clients, and members of her community.

Overcoming Barriers to Affordable Housing

Alex opened the door to his new apartment for the first time on Valentine's Day 2022. One week earlier, Alex and his HCP Transition Specialist, Kevin, were out to a birthday lunch. It was the first time Alex remembers being taken out to lunch for his birthday – and he is in his 20s. His birthday lunch was a bright spot in an otherwise anxious time.

At that point, Alex had been living in a hotel for nearly two months waiting for final approval to move into a new apartment. Alex's voucher application was approved in December 2021. He picked out a place to live. He was ready to move in and just needed to wait on the mandatory inspection of his new apartment. Due to forces outside his control, the wait lasted almost 2 months. He continued to work at a local restaurant and care for his baby girl on the weekends. With the help of our supporters, HCP was able to support him with groceries and ensure that he had temporary housing during the wait for final approval.

Three days after his birthday lunch, Alex got the best birthday present: final move-in approval! Four days after that, the Transition Specialist team was helping Alex move into his new apartment. Our supporters made sure he had a Welcome Home Basket to stock his cleaning closest and pantry. A lot changed in a week. He's now living in a place of his own that is down the road from Wake Tech where he wants to take classes, closer to more job opportunities, and a safe place to co-parent his baby girl. He'll continue to have the support of Kevin and the rest of the Transition Team over the next two years while he looks at enrolling in college and focuses on raising his daughter.

Hope Center at Pullen has been cheering Alex on, proving support and opportunities, since he was a young teenager. With your help, we're looking forward to continuing to support him as he reaches towards his goals."
