March 1 - Intergenerational Game Night: Women's History Trivia

March 22 - Book Discussion - "Straight, White Male"

Rev. Chris Furr, Pastor of Covenant Christian Church in Cary, will lead a discussion around deconstructing privilege through the lens of his recently released book, "Straight White Male: A Faith-Based Guide to Deconstructing your Privilege and Living with Integrity".

March 29 - Exploring the Experiences of Transgender Persons in Faith Community

As we approach Transgender Day of Visibility on March 31, Pullen member, Dev Green, will lead a teach-in sharing their own experiences as a transgender person in the world and in faith spaces in particular. They will lead us in a discussion about some of the challenges transgender persons face in faith community, and the importance of creating an inclusive and welcoming space for transgender persons.

Pullen's Social and Environmental Justice Lenten practice sign up!

Greener Lent is an invitation for individuals to follow Jesus's example during Lent by loving and caring for low income individuals, communities and the environment on a day to day basis - through how we feed ourselves.

This year, when signing up for the Greener Lent practice of choosing what level of animal products to do without, you will be recognizing and raising

your awareness of the effect our food choices are having on the environmental crisis and its harmful effect on many low income populations. Your participation will also contribute to reducing greenhouse gas emissions which increase with the high demand for meat consumption.

GIVE IT A TRY BECAUSE:

- Eating less meat is one of the easiest things we can do to address poverty and the climate crisis. Unchecked, climate change will push up to 130 million people into poverty over the next 10 years.
- Eating less meat reduces the demand for animal products which increases methane emissions into the atmosphere. It also reduces inefficient use of land, deforestation and depletion of groundwater.
- Your participation could help lower the "18% of human produced greenhouse gas
 emissions worldwide. This is more than all emissions from ships, planes, trucks, cars and all
 other transport put together."

Greener Lent offers a simple way to adopt a plant-rich diet while eating less meat or abstaining from meat for the 40 days of Lent. You can sign up on the website http://greenerlent.org/fast.html under Pullen Memorial Baptist Church on the "impact" drop down menu. (or by opening your camera app on the QR code above) and choose a goal of how much meat you want to reduce or eliminate. Each week during Lent you will receive graphic feedback about the amount of carbon dioxide Pullen participants are keeping out of the atmosphere by their food choices.

Inspired by Pope Francis's Laudato Si and created by a member of St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church in Raleigh, Greener Lent welcomes all people of faith and people of conscience to join together in this effort.

Fair Housing Testers Needed

The Fair Housing Project of Legal Aid of North Carolina is currently recruiting Fair Housing testers. Fair housing testers are part-time employees who assist in investigating the policies and practices of housing providers, such as landlords and property managers, to determine compliance with fair housing laws. The work is typically done through in-person site visits and telephone calls. The location of tests will be dependent on how far a tester is willing to travel.

Testers are paid a modest stipend (currently \$55 for an in-person site visit) and are also reimbursed for their mileage. Testing is done on a flexible schedule. Due to Covid-19, we have switched our testing to phone tests (\$35 per phone test, no mileage) but you would be trained for in-person testing to be prepared for that work.

Statewide all-day shape-note singing convention in Pullen's chapel: Saturday March 4, 2023

After a long pandemic pause since March 2020, the annual all-day North Carolina Shape-Note Singing Convention will return to Pullen's chapel on Saturday, March 4, 2023. Singers who meet monthly to sing in Raleigh, Durham, or Chapel Hill will host the event. In past years, 80–100 singers have attended from across NC as well as from several other states, and they love the acoustics of our chapel. This event is free of charge.

The convention will begin about 9 am, pause for a potluck lunch

in Finlator Hall, and then continue until about 4:00 pm or until voices give out, whichever happens first!

Extra copies of the tune book, *The Sacred Harp*—meaning the human voice—will be available to borrow or purchase. Anyone is welcome to sing or to listen, and to stay for a little while or all day. You may be familiar with this old American *a capella* tradition from hearing the *Sacred Harp* tune "Idumea" (YouTube audio, 3:19) sung in the film *Cold Mountain*. Shape-note music is participatory, not a performance, and formal music training is not required. Singers sit in a hollow square, one voice part per side (treble, alto, tenor/lead, bass), and anyone can sing any part. Many people take turns requesting tunes and leading them. The term "shape

note" derives from the shaped note heads in the music: rather than all round notes, there are triangles, circles, squares, and diamonds. To help singers learn or remember the tune, the participants "sing the shapes" (fa, sol, la, mi) the first time through before moving on to the text. We hope you can join us for any part of the day!

Doulas-in-Training

On February 24-26, members of our Transition Program and Teen Programs staff participated in a 3-day course to begin the process of becoming certified as doulas. Doulas are individuals knowledgeable about the childbirth process who support and advocate for a woman before, during and after labor as well during the post-partum period. Our youth expressed to us that they had feelings of confusion and helplessness while they tried to navigate the medical decisions around childbirth and post-partum care. They were faced with making decisions without someone to help them understand the long-term consequences of their choices. In addition, because most do not have a family support system, hospital rules meant that they could be entering the birthing room without a supportive presence to guide them during one of the most physically grueling and painful experiences they will face in life.

Because of the doula support from our staff, our youth will have the right to insist on having a guiding presence in the room with them and will consequently experience less trauma during labor, making them better able to take on the physical and emotional demands of the early newborn days. Thank you for supporting us as we expand our services to respond to the needs of our youth

<u>Transportation Volunteers Needed</u>

We are preparing for our 2023 Summer Internship Program. We partner with businesses and nonprofits across the Triangle to serve as job sites for our teens and young adults. The Hope Center brings youth onto our payroll and all participants are paid \$10 per hour for the work they do over the summer. Participants gain invaluable workplace skills in a supportive environment. Our staff support youth throughout the experience with scheduling, guidance on how to handle workplace communication, and workshops designed to help youth learn about taxes, money management, and HR.

Transportation can be a huge barrier for foster teens who want to work over the summer. We fill this gap with volunteers who ensure that teens can get to and from their job sites. Volunteers choose when and how often to help transport. We'd love your help whether you can commit to one ride over the summer or more.
