July 10: Womanist Theology – Womanist Wisdom: The Rev. Cheryl A. Kirk-Duggan, Ph.D.—Consultant, Scholar, Preacher, Author, and Performer—Founder and CEO for Dr. Cheryl Enterprises, LLC will lead a session that provides a thumbnail sketch of womanist theology and praxis, grounded in the thought of Alice Walker. Birthed in the 1980s as a discipline, the thought and activism of Africana women are longstanding and diverse, reflected in Walker's novel, The Color Purple. Using selected scripture as case studies in conversation with Walker's novel, our session includes applying the intersectional, interdisciplinary, intergenerational lens of womanist thought that engages the realities of gender, race, class, sexual orientation, age, and ability, all of which affect the experience of relationality. Breakfast will be bagels and fruit served by the young adults.

July 17: Pushing Back on Book Banning — Extremist politicians and outside groups with anti-CRT and anti-LGBTQ agenda are attacking our kids' education. An organized group of suburban women aren't having it. They believe that every child should be equipped for the 21st century, and that means learning real history (not fairy tales) and respecting people across our differences. It means ensuring every kid feels safe to learn and thrive at school.

Pullen News:

Missions and Outreach Allocates GEMS Grants

Pullen stewards an endowment fund to support building improvements and mission work. Positive trends in the stock market led to a significant growth in the past few years, allowing the Missions and Outreach Council to enhance our financial giving with the assistance of the Gifts, Endowments, and Memorials (GEMS) Committee. On April 10th, the Council voted to award grants totalling \$10,000 to six local and international causes. We took care fielding researched proposals and discussing where these funds will have the greatest impact in Pullen's expansive community - reflecting our pursuit of justice and love. The Missions and Outreach Council thanks the congregation for their continued support. The funds will be allocated in this way:

Housing All - \$3000; Housing All is a joint venture between Pullen and First Baptist Church Raleigh begun in 2020 to provide emergency housing and utilities assistance to area families.

Legal Expenses for Hadi and Maryam's Family - \$2000; The Sanctuary and Resettlement Group continues to support this Afghan family who faces thousands in legal costs while seeking asylum in the United States. Currently in the country on humanitarian parole, asylum is required for them to remain in the USA.

Peace Cathedral Refugee Assistance - \$2000; The need for refugee assistance has skyrocketed in Georgia as Russians flee their home country. This money will help the Peace Cathedral meet the needs of these refugees.

Cuba - \$2000; Cubans continue to face hardships during the pandemic. \$1500 will go to food

assistance to the Kairos Center in Matanzas and \$500 will go to First Baptist Matanzas.

Crossing Lines Africa - \$1000; Crossing Lines Africa provides LGBTQ Ugandans safety and medical attention in Kenya. They are currently expanding their facilities to accommodate the immense needs of this community. Crossing Lines Africa is an associate of the Baptist Peace Fellowship of North America.
