



Micah 6:8 and Recycling / Low Waste Practices

What does God require of us?



- "Love kindness" (Does this include treating Earth with kindness and respect to help sustain our relationship with her?)
- "Walk humbly with our God" (Does living more humbly by choosing Earth friendly practices nurture our relationship with God?)

YES! Perhaps we would all agree that this encouraging passage is not just for our relationships with one another, but also with Earth and its future inhabitants.

So how do we align these values with Earth loving consumer practices?

The Basics

- ◆ Reduce waste by making important lifestyle changes. This WakeGov site goes over the basics. http://www.wakegov.com/recycling/outreach/Pages/home.aspx
- Refuse a plastic bag whenever possible and bring your own. I love these compact ones! https://www.recycling.com/reusable-grocery-bags/
- ◆ **Do not contaminate your recycling bin**. It costs recovery facilities "more time and money" to sort out clean recyclables from contaminated bins, causing truck loads of otherwise recyclable items to go to the landfills. Check this site out on reducing contamination. https://raleighnc.gov/services/trash-recycling-and-clean/be-cart-smart-recycling
 - Recycle only what the facilities are accepting.
 - Plastic: Rinsed bottles, tubs, jugs and jars (no pumps)
 - Metal: All rinsed cans (no separate lids)
 - Glass: Rinsed bottles and jars (empty and rinse, no lids)
 - All paper: All paper, cartons and flattened cardboard (No tiny bits or shredded paper)

Buy Local

GoGreen's website has some important reasons why:

- Reduces Your Food Miles reduces fuel consumption and air pollution.
- More Accessible smaller retailer's can locate closer to local communities.
- Fresher and More Nutritious Produce Grocers who sell from local suppliers have less food waste than from long distant sellers.
- **Protects Local Land & Wildlife** Developers can transform the land, devastating the homes of wildlife. Big "business producers could buy out small farms and incorporate inhumane and non-eco-friendly farming practices."

 - Buying bulk and refillable items Cuts down on single use plastics and packaging.

In addition to these proactive steps, the pandemic has increased the need for us to be more vigilant with our waste. According to environmental action and advocacy group SoulBuffalo (https://soulbuffalo.com), plastic waste from disposable polypropylene masks to gloves to take out food containers worldwide has increased by 30%!

Friends, let's make sure we are broadening our practice of Micah 6:8 for our planet!

Thank you Mr. Dickens, we can relate. In these Pandemic days and in other days, Pullen has been someplace where we can turn our minds and hearts toward the best - to wisdom, belief, light, hope - while naming and confronting and contending with the worst - the foolishness, the incredulity, the darkness, the despair.

And in the simple matters of being the church, we find ourselves in days which are different for us, and days which are not so different as well.

For instance, this year, due to the wisdom of our leadership, we as a congregation are not meeting in large groups together, but alternately, via video screens and telephones and such. Consequently, we have not been able to meet as a church to hear and approve a working provisional budget for 2021. Rather the leadership decided that the Finance Committee should craft a budget for 2021 and then present it to the Coordinating Council for approval.

So, this is something that is different.

But then there follows something which is not different, but is what we do every year. The church sends out the 2021 budget to the membership, along with pledge cards (you have received this letter and the pledge cards in the mail). We are having speakers on Sundays, as we usually do, to focus on stewardship and remind us of the privilege we have to be part of Pullen and the hope that the church will continue to support and sustain its ongoing work.

The budget that was sent to you for review is very close to the current year's budget (it proposes an increase of \$16,477, or less than 1.5 percent, over this year's budget, to accommodate expected increases in health insurance for staff). It will stand as provisional until February 2021, when we will tabulate the pledges to determine if the amount pledged is sufficient to sustain the provisional budget. At that time, we hope to be able to gather in a congregational meeting to either sustain or revise the budget, based on the pledges.

The Finance Committee will continue to do our part by reminding the congregation that it is through these regular gifts and offerings from the church membership that Pullen may continue to turn our minds and hearts toward the best - to wisdom, belief, light, hope - while naming and confronting and contending with the worst - the foolishness, the incredulity, the darkness, the despair.

Please consider prayerfully and thoughtfully your pledge for 2021, and send the yellow pledge card to the church or make your pledge online using Realm at <u>pullen.org</u>. Together we can continue to be the faithful church we have so long been and will long be.

Entering a New Realm at Pullen!

We have launched a new tool to help us stay connected. Realm is a cloud based church management solution that makes it easier for our staff to connect with you and for you to connect with others in the Pullen community. With Realm you can share ideas with members of your council, committee or Sunday group in between meetings. Did you move or get rid of that landline? You can easily update your information without having to call the church office. Not only that, you can give, register for events and send a message to
