Earth Ministry Article: Climate Change: A Primer (Six Essential Topics)

This article explains the terms:

- 1) "the greenhouse effect,"
- 2) "fossil fuels."
- 3) "stratospheric ozone"
- 4) "the Goldilocks planet"
- 5) "fracking"
- 6) alternative, more realistic names for the totally understated descriptions of weather

disasters as "climate change" and "global warming"



1. Why is the overheating of the Earth's atmosphere referred to as "the greenhouse effect"?

While all heat in the solar system originates from the sun, most of the heat from the sun

which reaches the Earth would be reflected back into outer space if it were not trapped and held by gasses in the atmosphere, most especially

CO2 (Carbon Dioxide) and CH4 (Methane).

The sun's radiation of <u>visible light and Ultraviolet light</u> goes through the glass of the greenhouse roof and walls, hits the dirt inside the green house, and reradiates heat in the form of <u>infrared radiation</u>. The glass roof and walls of greenhouses do not allow infrared radiation to pass through their glass. Hence the heat is trapped. This is "the greenhouse effect."

A fuller descriptive name would be "the greenhouse glass infrared radiation heat-trapping effect."



The remaining three million dollars will be reallocated at the end of the year. They are eager to assess your roof for solar potential, provide a cost estimate, and help you apply for the Duke Energy nonprofit rebate program.

November Hope Center Updates

We are honored to share that The Hope Center at Pullen has received the 2022 Flame Award from the Aging Out Institute! The Aging Out Institute (AOI) promotes resources and strategies that help individuals and organizations support youth aging out of foster care. AOI gives out 5 awards each year to applicants from across the COUNTRY who represent a program or organization that supports youth aging out of foster care. We are thrilled that the hard work

our staff does day in and day out is being recognized.

Thank you to everyone who helps us carry out our award-winning programs. All of our tutors, transportation volunteers, office helpers, and donors are the reason we can provide these necessary and impactful services to Wake County's former foster youth.

Centering Mental Health

Our youth are making strides in all of the areas that are needed for safe and stable adulthood. This past year, with your support, we've been offering mental health stipends to youth who are interested in working with a mental health professional to heal from trauma. It's been the boost our youth need.

At the time of intake, 20% of Clients expressed interest in mental health services. After 60-90 days of engagement with their Transition Specialist, 50-52% of Clients are exploring or participating in mental health services.
