Another Stellar Lineup for Sunday Groups Beginning November 5, 2023

Traditions in Conflict: Matthew, Mark, and Luke Continues:

November 5, 12, 19 at 9:30 am in 310

The participants in this Sunday group have persuaded leader Nick Carter to continue this Sunday group for several more Sundays. Nick said to me: "These people are so dang smart and have so many questions it's taking longer to get through the material." Good for you Pullen folks. Keep the pressure on Nick with your questions!

This course brings a critical eye to the first three books of the New Testament: Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Exploring their similarities, problems, and inconsistencies, it will be accessible for the beginner and yet sufficiently challenging for the more serious student of the Bible. Why did they write their gospels in the first place and who was their audience? Who wrote first and did the others copy it? Why isn't the gospel of John being examined? How do their portraits of Jesus differ? These and other issues will be explored. Bring your Bible and your questions!

Exploring the Bible

November 5, 12, 19, 26, December 3, 10 in 307 and on Zoom at 9:30 am

Exploring the Bible is a Bible study class led by a rotating team of teachers, each leading several weeks to focus on various themes or Books of the Bible. The format involves some lecture and lots of open discussion. This class is taught by Lisa Grabarek, Jim Jarrard, Katie Founds, and Allen Page. These four offer a rich mix of life experiences in theological study, teaching, parish leadership, counseling, and social justice activism which promises a rewarding and stimulating class experience. There are no prerequisites to this class; no Bible study experience is necessary. All are welcome to join us.

How to Talk about Israel Palestine

November 5, 12, 19, and 26 in 203 at 9:30 am

This course, more than a historical or political assessment of the ongoing crisis in Gaza, is a space to cultivate the spiritual practice of deep listening in the midst of challenging ethical questions. How do we—as Christians, justice-seekers, peacemakers, U.S. Americans—talk about Israel Palestine in ways that are both faithful and responsible? This course will be lead by our pastor, Nancy Petty

The eyes of the world are on Rome as the Synod of Bishops gathers for two sessions over the next year. From questions of LGBTQIA+ inclusion to women's ordination, our Catholic siblings are in the midst of conversations that may radically shift the direction of the Church. The statements Pope Francis makes at the conclusion of these gatherings have the potential to shift the global conversation on these pressing social issues.

Jay Butler, husband to Grace Evans and a frequent participant in Pullen worship, values deeply his Catholic identity and his dedication to his Catholic faith. In the session on November 26, Jay will give his analysis of the issues facing the Catholic Church and his hopes for the current Synod of Bishops. The following Sunday, December 3, Jay will share his story on how the Catholic Church has shaped his faith. And on the final Sunday, December 10, he will talk about his monastic practices that come out of the Catholic tradition.

Jay Butler, partner at Parker Poe Adams & Bernstein, is Retired of Counsel. As a retired attorney, Jay is pursuing his academic interests. He is currently teaching a class on Western Monasticism in the NCSU OLLI program. Jay received his Bachelor of Arts in History and a French minor from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and his law degree from Harvard Law School. He and Grace have two adult daughters, Kate and Anna.

November 8 - A Rural Community Builds a Life-Giving Death Culture

What could change if we considered death-wise and refused to curse it? What if our way of dying was how we eldered and sustained a future of mutuality and care? A collective remembering is currently underway to return death and grief to its rightful place - a community's hands. Join Katherine Savage and Jennifer Dorfield for stories of how

the tiny community of Celo is doing just this. Katherine Savage is a death midwife whose purpose is to build a culture in which people attune their lives to the universal forces of creation and dissolution so that death can become their teacher. Raised at Pullen by parents who began their courtship there, she took its radical gospel to Celo 7 years ago, where the Wild Voice inspires her each time she steps out the door, to become community care. Jennifer Dorfield is a certified wholeness energetics practitioner and mom to Julius, who died unexpectedly by suicide on November 11 of last year. What helped her family tremendously in this experience was living in a place that still "does" community, and in being so, transformed the most tragic experience of their lives into perhaps the most beautiful.
