Dear Pullen Members and Supporters,

As we steadily approach a new calendar year and thus a new Pullen budget for 2022, I first digress with an extraordinary amount of gratitude. I have been thankful this year to serve as Co-Chair of the Finance Committee with Linda Silber. The gratitude we share is much in part to your unending support—not only spiritually but financially. We as an institution have not only weathered possible financial hardships as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic but we are poised to enter another year on extremely sound economic footing. This has only been possible because of the trust and confidence you show with your commitment to giving week after week and month after month. So, thank you, for standing with us even when we can't always physically stand together.

Pullen has not always had such high levels of confidence when it comes to solvency. There have

been years when serious cuts had to be made. There have been years where (I learned) we had to have tough conversations because we knew that cuts, when it comes to some things, are morally undesirable. I have worked with and led many Finance groups and teams outside of Pullen. It can be a tough and unglamorous job. You all made it a little less tough (though still not glamorous ©) because you stepped up to the plate with pledges and carried through with them.

Even with all of the uncertainty going into 2021 we were able to maintain a budget that was essentially flat from 2020. In fact, we are within \$700 of the 2020 budget. We are on pace to spend about \$1.18 million in 2021. We reflected as a team at a recent Finance meeting that not only are we on track to achieve the 2021 budget, but we are in a slightly better position than we normally are at this time of the year. Now before we get too excited, I want to remind you about the Paycheck Protection Program loan-turned-grant that we received from the federal government last vear. Because of this emergency relief, we carried over about \$93,000 from 2020 to 2021. Recall that, at the time of accepting the assistance, no one had any idea what lay ahead. Would many Pullen family members lose their jobs? Would investments that some count on to give to Pullen be decimated? Would social security payments be jeopardized because of this unprecedented global pandemic? Needless to sav. so far the sky has not fallen to the extent it could have.

All of the unknowns of the pandemic made it quite challenging when it came to crafting the 2021 budget. One example is that as many of us witnessed, streaming services and reliability had hiccups early on. We have made technological upgrades for internet speed and other virtually enabling services such as Zoom. These costs were higher. We simultaneously did not return to in-person services and some mission work as quickly as anticipated. Thus, money in the budget ebbed and flowed. A huge thanks to everyone who owns a piece of the budget...your diligence in managing costs has been terrific.

While we have worked hard as a congregation and Finance Committee to be in a healthy fiscal position, it is that time to ask for your support to maintain and even strengthen our finances as we approach 2022. We all have ideas about how to expand Pullen's reach through more incredible mission work. To build on what we have we must first reaffirm our commitments to where we are today. If you can go above and beyond your 2021 giving, please think about doing so. If your financial situation has become more stressful and you need to adjust your giving downward, we are here to support you regardless of what you are able to contribute. (REMINDER: No one is privy to giving amounts other than the Church Administrator.)

On behalf of the Finance Committee, please join me in signing into Realm and making your pledge early. You will receive a budget letter in the mail soon. We are

using a music theme this year, with a reminder that "Every Note Counts." So does every dollar, and every pledge. You are the reason we can continue to pass along Pullen's song from generation to generation, and from Raleigh throughout the world.




Child hunger has skyrocketed during the pandemic, both at home and abroad. The Child Tax Credit in the American Rescue Plan is lifting millions of children, nearly half, out of poverty right now. You may be aware of PMW as the women who collect non-perishable food for the Urban Ministries Food Pantry, and we and all of our hungry neighbors greatly appreciate your generosity.

We are Pullen MISSION Women after all, but the word mission doesn't capture the full essence of our membership experience. We do, each month from September through June, support one of the causes chosen by our membership. This year, we are supporting the Hope Center at Pullen, Urban Ministries Crisis Intervention Center, AMOS Health and Hope in Nicaragua, Housing All, FIGS prescription assistance, the Helen Wright Center for Women, Pullen's own Round Table, Emmaus

House for men, the Interfaith Prison Ministry for Women and the PMW Community Missions Fund.

In February we also put together hygiene kits for migrant farmworkers, who arrive in NC without resources. These kits are distributed to NC labor camps by the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry.

While we have hoped for goals each month for each cause, there is no fixed amount required or even expected by an individual member. In other words, giving according to one's passion and ability is customary, but not mandatory to be a member and to participate in Pullen Mission Women-there are no pledges in PMW.

To really understand us, you need to know that we are a group of Pullen women who truly care for one another. If you want to support a cause you could simply drop a check in the mail. What PMW offers in addition to its heart for mission is its heart for one another. We are a close and mutually supportive community. We share good times and bad with one another and get to know each other better and better month by month. Joining PMW is a wonderful way to get to know other Pullen women and to feel even more connected to Pullen. Membership in PMW is a wonderful resource for new Pullenites as well as long-term members who would like to enjoy the monthly fellowship of other Pullen women.

Normally, we have a brunch on Valentine's Day and a potluck dinner for our annual meeting in June. We often go out together in December to celebrate Christmas and have had several of those luncheons at the University Club. At the current moment, though, to keep each of us safe, we have been meeting via Zoom. We have a variety of interesting speakers as well as time to check in with one another. PMW is co-led by an Executive Committee comprised of Cathy Corbin and Cindy Chew (co-chairs) Sandra Brown (secretary), Pat Long (treasurer), and Julia Williams (our representative to Church Women United). Solar Panel Update

The finance committee ran a 30k 30 days + campaign to secure the funding for the nearly \$130,000 solar project so that Pullen could own it debt-free.

The Earth Ministries who spearheaded the project from inception to signing the contract along with the finance committee cannot thank you enough. However, at what was supposed to have been our last posting about the campaign 2 weeks ago, the content contained an error that needs clarifying. The campaign itself did not receive \$38,651.70 as previously noted, but rather we received \$26,637 toward this project. This leaves a balance of \$3363 to pay off the debt. 



ONE Wake Update: Take Action on Rising Property Taxes

Did you know that property taxes in some low and fixed-income neighborhoods in Raleigh have doubled and even tripled since 2016 as a result of gentrification? Through community canvassing efforts in some of these neighborhoods over the summer, the issue of rising property taxes was one of the top concerns raised by residents. After several meetings, these long-time residents have decided to ask the city and county to prioritize assistance to offset the impact of soaring property taxes in their spring budget planning. On October 21 at 6:30 pm at Southeast Raleigh Table (1950 New Bern Ave.), they will ask elected officials for their commitment. This is a hybrid meeting with the option to join virtually. As a ONE Wake member institution, Pullen has pledged to bring 50 people from our church in support of this effort. We hope you will be in the number!
