### **Pullen-Wiley Partnership Tutoring Opportunity**

The pandemic interrupted the program abruptly when the schools turned to virtual learning in early 2020. This fall, volunteers are again being welcomed in schools, and so we have an opportunity to consider re-starting the tutoring program at Pullen on Wednesdays.

WCPSS is partnering with the YMCA to provide the HELPS tutor training program, targeted to improve reading fluency. This is the


area that has been determined to be the greatest area of need to help students recover from the learning losses they have experienced. The YMCA has agreed to include our volunteers in the training which will take place in October.

# A Letter From The Personnel Committee:

September 27, 2022

Dear Pullen Family,

The Personnel Committee (PC) has spent the past several months deliberating various configurations of administrative staff based on the resignation of our Facilities Manager and the wish to build upon the improvements that have been made this past year in Communications, both within the church and in the wider community. Our planned changes would revise job descriptions for two non-elected positions. This letter describes those changes for your consideration and comment. The first change is a revision of duties and hours for the Church Administrator (CA) and is related to the recently announced retirement of our current Facilities Manager (FM), Warren Chesson, at the end of this year. The FM role has been an important one over the past few years as we have grappled with maintenance challenges in our church facility and made important improvements to our Cox Avenue building. With input from Warren, our current CA Vicky Bass, and the Building and Grounds Committee, we understand that many aspects of the FM role as currently defined can be replaced with a part-time Maintenance Technician (MT) during 2023. We anticipate hiring an MT in July 2023.

Key to the success of this change is the transfer of maintenance management and supervision from the FM role to the CA role. Considerable planning has gone into this, and the change is expected to result in an overall maintenance plan for our facilities. From this approach, assignments for maintenance tasks will go to Handy Corps, the MT, or external vendors as appropriate. Dedicated software that assists with such maintenance planning is currently being evaluated. The Personnel Committee recommends the elimination of the FM role and the addition of eight hours per week to the CA role, an increase from 32 to 40.

The second change would increase permanently the hours of Communications Director (CD) from 32 to 40 hours per week. As you may recall, in the fall of 2021 PC increased the hours of the CD from 32 to 40 hours per week to help cover administrative duties in the absence of a CA and to create procedural manuals for the administrative staff. After the hiring of a new CA in May 2022 PC allowed this position to remain at its reconfigured hours due to a variety of reasons, but not limited to the following:

- The anticipated Fall 2022 reopening of all programming on Sunday morning and Wednesday night created an increased workload.
- Requests for assistance from the CD from staff, councils, and committees have increased.
- Pullen has welcomed an increasing number of visitors and new members who became aware of PMBC through our presence on social media Continuing to expand our web presence is a priority for Pullen.
- During and coming out of the pandemic, a recognizable trend in churches has been the hiring and/or increasing the hours of Communications staff.

Your Personnel Committee believes that Pullen will be well served in the future by maintaining our CD at 40 hours per week.

# Solarize the Triangle Info Session

October 18, 7:00-8:00 pm on Zoom

Join Interfaith Creation Care of the Triangle and Solarize the **Triangle** to learn how homeowners and nonprofits can install solar and battery storage while navigating multiple layers of cost savings. As a result we will be better stewards of our own and our congregation's finances and better stewards of the Earth. The savings include:

Crowdsourcing with up to 25% savings with Solarize the

- 30% point of purchase direct pay through the Inflation Recovery Act + additional 10% for low
- income communities available in 2023 Duke Energy Rebate up to \$75,000 for 100 kw for non-profits. Currently, the rebate must be •
- reserved by December 31, 2022; panels do not have to be installed by this date. There is still \$3,000,000 in this pot, making approval of a request more likely.



### Housing All Update Late September

If you have been able to keep up with life around us in Wake County, you've seen and experienced increased prices in everything. Food prices have increased while the portions have decreased. Gasoline fluctuates between \$3.20-\$4.00+ per gallon. The average price to rent a 2 bedroom apartment in the Raleigh area averages \$1,900.00 a month.

Housing All is a collaboration between Pullen and First Baptist Church on Salisbury St. to provide assistance with back rent and utilities. Over the

approximate two years, improvements have been made to the process of taking calls, evaluating the assistance requested, filling out intake forms, making decisions on how much could be offered, and responding to each person as quickly as we could. In the beginning volunteers from each church signed up for a week, and the resources of both churches were pooled. At this time, however, one of the updates to the process is that Pullen volunteers handle the first week each month while FBC takes care of the rest of the month, with each church using its own resources for its week(s). FBC has committed to the larger portion

because they have greater resources. The number of callers each week can range from 10-20, with the average closer to 20. FBC, for the first seven months of 2022 provided over \$21,000.00 in assistance (during this period Pullen was not able to participate but did send approximately \$4,800.00 to FBC).

The situations we hear on each call are heartbreaking, especially when children are involved. Many of of our callers are women with children, or grandmothers providing what they can to their children/grandchildren. Some of our callers are working 3 part-time jobs where all it takes is a sick child or the working person to have to take time off (where there is no sick leave) to put paying that month's bills in jeopardy.....and YES, these families are sent eviction notices!

Pullen's Mission and Outreach budget for 2023 has allotted \$6,500.00 for use by Housing All. Truth be told, we could easily disperse that amount in 2 months and still leave many without our help. Most of us don't have to decide about spending money for a half-tank of gas to get to our job or paying something toward a utility bill or a portion of the rent. One thing that surprised me in the beginning was that many of the people that we say NO to still thank us for taking time and for calling them back. Having to say that we cannot help is still a hard thing to do.

We are still looking for ways to increase our ability to help those who call on Housing All for assistance. Our current volunteers are Emily Cato, Robin Morris, and Sharron Underwood. The staff representative to the Missions and Outreach council is Ian McPherson.

#### **Hope Center Update**

#### **October Hope Center Updates**

It's been an exciting month at HCP. Our Teen Programs kicked-off the 2022-23 academic year. Tutors are meeting with youth to help them stay on top of their studies. LINKS, our life-skills classes that we co-facilitate with Wake County, started back with a party at Pullen Park. Over the course of the year, our Teens will meet weekly to learn about financial management, physical & mental well-being, college preparedness, and so much more.

#### Thank You for Your Support

In 2021-22, we served 66 young adults and children in our Transition Program and almost 80 teens in our Teen Programs. With your support, we worked with them to achieve goals in housing, employment and education. Here's a glimpse of what their progress looked like:

- 100% of clients we housed 2 years ago continue to maintain safe and stable housing.
- More former foster youth are mastering the skills needed to maintain employment longterm. The number of youth who successfully maintained employment for 1 year with the same employer increased by over 70% year-over-year from 2020/21 to 2021/22.
- More young adults are pursuing the post-secondary education needed to achieve their career goals. At the end of our 2021-22 program year, 64% of our youth were pursuing secondary education, a significant jump from our 2020-21 program year where 44% of our youth were pursuing secondary education.
