Exploring the Bible

Sundays, Now- May 19 at 9:30 am in 307 and on Zoom

Exploring the Bible is a Bible study class led by a rotating team of teachers. Each one leads several weeks to focus on various themes or Books of the Bible. The format involves some lecture and open discussion. On April 7 and 14, Allen Page will lead us in focusing on providing a "corrective" approach to viewing the "ransom passages" of the New Testament, for example, Mark 10:45. These passages have often been the primary filter for understanding the Gospel. We will attempt to see these passages through an alternative lens. On April 21, we will consider the Passover, which will be celebrated during that week. Lisa Grabarek will lead the April 28 class as we look at Philippians 2:12-13. We will consider what it might mean to "work out our own salvation with fear and trembling."

North Carolina's Political Landscape and a Faith Response *April 21, 28, May 5 in 203*

April 21 – Many people are saying that 2024 will be the most important and potentially impactful election year in modern U.S. and North Carolina history, but what's really on the ballot and at stake? In this season, Rob Schofield, the Editor of NC Newsline (and Pullen member), will summarize some of the key races and policy debates that will dominate news coverage and public discussion between now and November and help us think about how we can remain fully informed and engaged.

April 28 – A panel of Pullenites lead by Cathy Tamsberg and Jeff Cherry will share their perspective on what they see as the important issues in this election year and how they are engaging on a state and national level to make a difference in the outcomes. Conversation facilitated by Nancy Petty.

May 5 – Rev. Rob Stephens will offer his perspective on a faithful response to the moral issues impacting this election, specifically in North Carolina. Rob will also discuss ways that people of faith can be involved in our state and national elections. Rob is an organizer with Repairers of the Breach and the Poor People's Campaign. He also served on Cheri Beasley's campaign for US Senate. Rob is a dear friend of Pullen Church.

Eco-Theology and Eco-Spirituality 101

April 21, 28 in 310

April 21 - Rev. Ian McPherson will lead an Eco-Theology 101 class lifting up some Biblical and Christian theo-ethical approaches to environmental justice and creation care. Together we will encounter artists, activists, church leaders, and scholars who will embolden our faithful response to the climate crisis and reconnect us with our faith's deep reverence for God's Creation.

April 28th - Carol Lenox will lead a session on eco-spirituality. Carol is an employee of the Environmental Protection Agency, has a Masters in Pastoral Studies with a focus on spirituality and ecology, and is an avid student of Christian thinkers and writers such as Thomas Berry and Teilhard de Chardin. Participants will be led in a discussion on eco- sprituality followed by the use of Christian ecological texts in Lectio Divina, an ancient way of reading scriptures that includes prayer and contemplation on the written word.

April 3 - Deconstructing White Privilege

As part of Pullen's ongoing conversation around anti-racism, this program will begin with a 20 minute video clip of Robin D'Angelo talking about *Deconstructing White Privilege*, followed by an open and honest conversation about key ideas in the film that will be facilitated by Cathy Tamsberg and Chris Schwertman. The film is a powerful and succinct distillation of Robin D'Angelo's analysis of the pillars of white privilege, white identity, and white fragility which white people need to understand in order to be responsible and constructive allies with BIPOC people in undertaking anti-racism work.

D'Angelo is a professor and scholar in the area of Whiteness Studies and is best known for her book, "White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism."

April 10 - A First Step for Social Justice: Identifying Pullen's Nonprofit Partnerships

Pullen's recent Vision Statement charged the congregation with identifying "a few non-profits working on social justice issues in the larger Raleigh community to partner with for five years." Tasked with leading this process, the Missions and Outreach Council invites all Pullenites for a congregation-wide conversation facilitated by Rev. Ian. This will be our first step in discerning together what justice issues and partner organizations we hope to prioritize in the coming years.

April 17 - Indigenous Spiritualities Worship Lab

Norma Merriman will provide an overview to Pullen congregants of Cherokee beliefs and spiritual practices that demonstrate the interconnectedness of the spirit, all living things, and the earth. We will be exposed to a Cherokee spiritual ceremony, including a discussion of practices at the Stomp/Ceremonial grounds. Expected outcomes are that participants will understand that each Native tribe has distinct spiritual beliefs and methods of spiritual practice, and will learn the Cherokee worldview. Norma is a regular attendee at Pullen and a Citizen of the Cherokee Nation located in Northeastern Oklahoma.

April 24 - Ask the (Associate) Pastor

You know the drill, this is your opportunity to ask your Associate Pastor questions about anything from theology to current events to a lingering wondering from a past sermon. Chalice will begin by giving a little background about her life before opening the floor for questions. Then comes the twist–the pastor will ask back! Chalice will ask you about some of the things that she's curious about, and give you some time to get curious about one another. Come out for a night of community connection!

Join Pullen's Earth Ministries for These Opportunities in Celebration of Earth Day:

On Wednesday night, April 17 from 6:30 pm to 7:30pm in the Chapel, Norma Merriman will provide an overview to Pullen congregants of Cherokee beliefs and spiritual practices that demonstrate the interconnectedness of the spirit, all living things, and the earth. We will be exposed to a Cherokee spiritual ceremony, including a discussion of practices at the Stomp/Ceremonial grounds. Expected outcomes are that participants will understand that each Native tribe has distinct

spiritual beliefs and methods of spiritual practice, and will learn the Cherokee worldview. Norma is a regular attendee at Pullen and a Citizen of the Cherokee Nation located in Northeastern Oklahoma.

Rev. Ian McPherson will lead an Eco-Theology 101 class on Sunday, April 21st from 9:30am-10:30am, briefly reviewing some Biblical and Christian theo-ethical approaches to environmental injustice/creation care. They/He hopes to feature voices such as Hebrew Bible scholar Ellen Davis on the Creation narrative in Genesis; Rev. Dr. Benjamin Davis (UCC Minister from Warren County, NC) on Christian responses to environmental injustice; William Barber III (son of Bishop William Barber II) on grassroots organizing and intersections between poverty and ecology; ecofeminist and ecowomanist scholars who challenged the white, male lens often brought to this field's earliest work; and Catholics teachers like Thomas Berry and leaders like Pope Francis.

On Sunday, April 28th from 9:30am-10:30am, Earth Ministry will be joined by Carol Lenox for a focus on eco-spirituality. Carol is an employee of the Environmental Protection Agency, has a Masters in Pastoral Studies with a focus on spirituality and ecology, and is an avid student of Christian thinkers and writers such as Thomas Berry and Teilhard de Chardin. Participants will be led in a discussion on eco-spirituality followed by the use of Christian ecological texts in Lectio Divina, an ancient way of reading scriptures that includes prayer and contemplation on the written word.

Imagine God! A Multigenerational Worship Experience

May 5 at 11:00 am in the Sanctuary

led by the Children's, Youth, and Adult Choirs

Through story, song, and creative arts, the Children's Choir and Sunday Groups for Kids have explored many different ways to imagine the divine. Join them on Sunday, May 5, as they lead in imaginative worship through the musical, Imagine God! by Jann Aldredge-Clanton and Larry E. Schultz.

Imagine God! 20 Years Later

In 2004, a musical created by Jann Aldredge-Clanton and me was published by Choristers Guild and released into the world. Though focused upon Children's Choirs, it also invited multiple generations to participate in a variety of ways. The musical explored and expressed a diversity of divine images found in the Bible and

included feminine along with masculine and non-gender depictions of God. At the time of its publication, singing of God as "She" was met with a variety of reactions, even though the Bible includes imageries for God such as "Mother Eagle," "Lady Wisdom" or the feminine Hebrew "Ruah" for "Breath." As discrimination and patriarchal systems continued in the early part of the 21 st Century, one of our hopes for the musical was for girls and women to know and celebrate that they are also part of the Divine. While singing to God as both "He" and "She" is important for individuals to realize their own divine connection, as the years and our understandings progressed, we awakened to the truth that there are others who do not identify as either "She" or "He," and that they, too, are in God's image. While creating the musical for its 2004 publication, Jann penned a lyric that prophetically expressed God as "She and He and so much more." Now, 20 years later, we know that part of the "so much more" are persons who identify as "They." With this understanding, we have updated the musical's words to move beyond the binary in expressing God as "She and He and They and more." We hope this expanded language has been meaningful as the musical provided a curriculum for Children's Choir and Sunday Kids Group this year, and as the children lead us in an "Imagine God!" worship experience on Sunday, May 5.



This spring has been a busy time for HOST, and in the spirit of Spring, we are growing and experiencing new things.

- We matched our first family, a student with a teenage son, with a host home, which will provide this family with a safe, stable place to finish out their spring semesters of school before they start looking for permanent housing.
- We have started working with our first students from Meredith College and St. Augustine's University. We are working to match these students with summer host homes.
- The HOST Board of Directors and staff are engaging in strategic planning with the support of consultants from Partners for Impact, Inc., and funding from Triangle Community Foundation.

If you are looking for a new experience this spring, please consider the following ways to support HOST and the students we serve.

- 1. Attend our next information session on Tuesday, April 9, at 11:30 AM at the HOST office to learn about becoming a host home to provide college students with safe, welcoming housing while they continue school and look for permanent housing.
