Living Beyond the Knowing

There are certain themes that I seem to keep circling in this life. Some of them, like forgiveness and grace, are theological in nature. Others, are more focused on my life. For example, the question I regularly ask myself: Am I enough? One theme that seems to blend both the theological and the personal is this notion of *living in the not knowing*. I was actually writing a sermon on this theme the weekend Karla had her heart attack. I was about two-thirds through my writing when Karla called to tell me I needed to meet her at the hospital. As of this writing, I have not completed that sermon. In the days following Karla's heart attack the theme seemed a little too close to home to pick it back up. But the theme has stayed with me in a slightly different form. Realizing that there are so many things that we just can't know I began wondering about *living beyond the knowing*.

As curious people we like knowing. Why did that happen? What's happening right now? What will happen in the future? It's human nature to want to know. Knowledge gives us agency. It gives us power and it empowers us. Knowing can also offer relief. It's hard to not know the test results and to have to wait hours or days on them. These days, it's anxiety producing to not know if the flu like symptoms are the flu or COVID. Not knowing is hard and challenging.

With all the knowledge we have, literally at our fingertips, it seems that much of our life is spent living is the space of not yet knowing. Sure, we know a lot. But when you put our knowledge alongside the great mysteries of life, our knowledge is like a grain of sand on the ocean floor. And so it is, in this knowledge, I have been thinking about this notion of *living beyond the knowing*. To live not knowing what we wished we knew is one thing. But



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having a willingness to embrace living beyond the knowing is, I am learning, a deeper spiritual practice. This practice is requiring a new kind of trust on my part. A kind of trust that grounds me and holds me in the most challenging life moments. A kind of trust that allows me to release my grip. A kind of trust that reminds me there is a force of goodness and love in this universe at work and I can choose to join that force no matter what my challenges might be.

In the past week, I have been asked the question numerous times: What is the fall going to look like at church? With this new delta variant will we keep meeting in-person for worship? Will we be able to come back to church for The Table on Wednesday nights? Can groups start meeting again at the church? The "not knowing" what the fall will look like for our communal life together is frustrating at best. And time will only answer that question.

And so, I am making a commitment (and challenging you to do the same) in the months ahead to practice this idea of *living beyond the knowing*. Live! Beyond! The Knowing! Let these days bring you surprise. Welcome into your heart a new kind of trust that opens up a life beyond the knowing. Release your grip on having to know what is coming next. Live in that space that affirms that there is a force of goodness and love in this universe at work and you/we can choose to join that force; and even in the midst of a global pandemic we can still make a difference in the world. *-Nancy E. 


Cox Avenue Update

And the walls came tumbling down.....



Fall Music Ministry Groups

With new opportunities and safety protocols, Music Ministry Groups resume in-person gatherings this fall.* Chancel Choir, Pullen Orchestra, Children's Choir and Music Discovery Groups will begin in September with Youth Choir beginning in January 2022.

Are you an adult who has wanted to participate in Chancel Choir in the past, but didn't want to miss other Wednesday night programming? Or, are you an instrumentalist who has desired to play in the Pullen Orchestra but didn't want to miss participation in other Sunday Groups? If so, good news! An integrated approach to adult education at Pullen will make it possible. This fall, Sunday mornings and Wednesday evenings will no longer be geared toward specific kinds of adult education groups and programs, as both days will include a variety. One might find a typical "Wednesday night" program on Sunday, or on Wednesday, might discover a "Group" experience that previously occurred on Sunday morning. Chancel Choir and Pullen Orchestra are included in these opportunities and all adults are warmly welcomed to participate.

Chancel Choir rehearsals resume on Wednesday, September 1, from 6:30-7:30PM in the Sanctuary. **Pullen Orchestra** resumes with a Saturday morning rehearsal on September 11 at 10:00AM in the Sanctuary (following Sunday in the Park, rehearsals are on Sundays from (9:00AM-10:00AM). **Children's Choir** resumes on Wednesday, September 15, from 6:00-6:30PM in the Rehearsal Hall, and **Music Discovery** resumes the same evening at 6:30PM in Room 122.

*Covid vaccination is currently required for adult participation in Music Ministry Groups. Participants in Chancel Choir, Children's Choir and Pullen Orchestra will be provided with singer or instrumentalist masks and appropriate instrument covers for singing and playing indoors. Music Ministry Groups will follow the CDC and Pullen Church safety protocol guidelines, not excluding the possibility of suspended activity if deemed necessary.

Fall Adult Groups on Wednesday and Sunday



This Fall, Adult Education at Pullen will occur on Sunday and Wednesdays. This is an effort to integrate our approach to faith formation, spiritual practices, biblical education, music ministry, and community advocacy. Each Wednesday and Sunday will be anchored with traditional groups and gatherings while being supplemented with shorter, topic-specific classes. Adults will have the opportunity to choose between classes, combining experiences that fit their needs and enhance their faith.

Several times during the fall we will come together for an all-congregation gathering featuring special guests and topics. Wednesday, October 20th will be an all-community gathering. On Sunday, October 31, LaShauna Austria will talk about her work as a farmer, activist, and ordained minister in the United Church of Christ. Pullen will commemorate World AIDS Day on Wednesday, December 1st. Brian Crisp and Charles Holden will explore the art of Advent and Nativity on Sunday, December 12th. In addition we will have our traditional Advent Candlelight Service on Wednesday, December 8th and LoveFeast on Wednesday, December 15th.

Wednesday Group Offerings

Are We Fragile? Exploring White Fragility Among Progressives//Room 203

Using Robin DeAngelo's widely acclaimed book *"White Fragility: Why It's So Hard to Talk About Racism,"* this series will explore whether it's true that white progressives are obstacles to addressing personal and systemic racism. Eight Wednesday evening sessions led by Cathy Tamsberg, will include consideration of the major themes in DeAngelo's book as well as critiques of her analysis.

Defund The Police?

This abolition curriculum from the Mennonite Church dives into the history of policing and challenges us to see what public safety and transformative justice might look like outside of policing. This class is a joint endeavor with the United Church of Chapel Hill, co-led by Chalice Overy and Ian McPherson Participants can access this group in person or online, space is limited. We ask participants to sign up via Realm and commit to attend at least 6 of the 8 sessions.

Chancel Choir

This group provides worship leadership through the choral art as it engages the texts and music of hymns, anthems, service music and larger choral works that resonate the values of the Pullen congregation. Annual participation in the adult choir, *Festival by the Sea* in Charleston, South Carolina, provides the experience of singing with other regional choirs while working with some of the nation's finest choral clinicians. Offering the opportunity for progressive growth in communal music-making, this group welcomes all adults with any or no prior choral experience.

Earth Ministry

This dedicated group of people seeking ways to live a life that cares for Creation as part of our Christian Spiritual practices. This ministry creates opportunities to educate the congregation on ways that we can individually, and collectively, live a sustainable relationship with our planet.

Wednesday Group Offerings continued

Free Thinkers

Free Thinkers is a discussion-based class that grapples with hard questions in the current political and social world. These discussions are informed by written, oral and visual references that encourage and enlighten the commitment of participants to justice and compassion in our personal and civic lives. Participants may access this group in person or online.

Sunday Group Offerings

Discoverers | Room 303

The Discoverers Sunday Group moves into another uncertain year for gathering in person heartened by the time we've spent together virtually during the pandemic. If meeting in person is safe, Discoverers will gather on Sunday mornings to consider topics that will help us become better human beings, more loving in our relationships, and more courageous in supporting God's justice work in the world. Leadership of this Group is shared by members who will kick-off each enthusiastic discussion with a podcast, a poem, a piece of art, or another conversation-starter. We hope to be able to offer a hybrid format so those not able to be present in the room can join us via zoom. All are welcome.

Exploring the Bible | Room 307

With a rotating roster of teachers, Exploring the Bible focuses on thematic, topical, and exegetical passages from the Hebrew Bible and the New Testament. The group combines the best and current practices of biblical scholarship with contemporary issues and social situations. Participants may access this group in person or online.

The MacMillian Group

This group looks to stories and life for great questions and greater answers.

Pullen Orchestra

This intergenerational group combines both adults and youth to provide instrumental music and accompaniments for services of worship at Pullen and for community events. Players of wind, string and percussion instruments (intermediate level and beyond) are invited to participate.

Pullen 101 | Room 203

This 8-week course introduces people to the culture and ministries of Pullen Memorial Baptist.

Spiritual Practices | Poteat Chapel

This group will continue to deepen its exploration of contemplative practices in a worship-like fashion, including centering prayer, chant, lovingkindness meditation and lectio divina. This year, we will expand our practices to acknowledge our relationship with the natural world.

Witnessing Whiteness

This class will consist of a series of workshops based on the book *"Witnessing Whiteness: The Need to Talk About Race and How to Do It"*, by Shelly Tochluk, a white educator with a background in psychology, who spent ten years as a researcher, counselor, and teacher in California's public schools. Facilitated by Chris Schwertman, each week participants will read and discuss a chapter of the book, using experiential activities, to help explore the white experience and culture. The goal is to build a shared understanding of privilege, whiteness, and racism, and increase our ability to become effective in racial justice work. To really understand and ultimately address how whiteness affects racism, it is important to commit to attending as many of the eight workshops as possible and doing the assigned readings each week from the book. The required reading for each workshop is approximately 25 pages.

Abbey in the Driver's Seat

If anyone wants to hear what it has been like for an adult (Abbey) to earn a driver's permit from the North Carolina DMV during COVID, be sure you have plenty of time to listen. You may recall that Abbey is the gentleman that the Pullen Resettlement and Sanctuary Committee has been working with for the past year and a half; who due to the COVID lockdown had to live in our church for several months.

Aside from becoming fully vaccinated against COVID, a driver's permit has been Abbey's top priority lately. We are proud to say that he now has that permit, and is eligible to take the road test for his license in mid-September. He received six hours of professional driving instruction in July. Now, all that stands between him and a license is driving experience and a road test. After that, all that stands between him and being in the "driver's seat" of his life is a safe, reliable car to drive.

Through our relationship with Abbey, we witnessed the many things he has needed to become accustomed to the demands and requirements of living successfully here. Once again, we were reminded that we take for granted our freedom and privilege. In just one life area, Abbey's struggles demonstrated to us the importance of having a driver's license: the hardship and lack of privacy that come without having one, the freedom of transporting oneself, the restrictions of relying on other people to get around, the credibility a driver's license gives, and the means to do simple tasks of daily life.

Recently, we held a pot-luck supper for Abbey in Finlator Hall to celebrate his many accomplishments. Some of us had not physically seen Abbey in person since the COVID lockdown, but participated in many online meetings with him. We cannot forget a shout-out to modern technology, or most of the progress we made would have been next to impossible.

At our gathering, we celebrated with Abbey such things as his permanent job status at Millenium Printing, the health insurance that comes with it, his full vaccination status, earning his driver's permit, his researching car ownership, his participation in classes at Wake Tech, his openness to future planning and the new friendships and family ties he has cultivated.

Afterwards, we came away knowing that through our involvement with Abbey and his involvement with us, we all had become closer to one another despite the heavy wall of physical confinement during COVID. Also, we learned that some of us have some really good pot-luck recipes. We regret that we cannot share a photo of the food, especially Serena's beautiful deviled egg tower...
