Staffing Update from Personnel Committee

Over the past sixteen months of the pandemic, our ministerial and administrative staffs have worked incredibly hard continuing to deliver and support Pullen's missions and goals, while being attentive to its congregants and the larger community. Based on intense study and careful consideration, the Personnel Committee has determined that some changes to the administrative staff's work, including certain staff position changes, will better meet the church's needs going forward. We want to share with you the following position changes:

- Facilities Manager Warren Chesson requested a reduction in hours from 30 to 22 per week. He and Sylvanda have completed major work on the Cox Avenue building, along with contractors, and it is felt this reduction in hours is appropriate. Warren will continue to be on call for any facility emergencies.
- Custodian Sylvanda Judd will continue to work a 40-hour week, though some of Sylvanda's normal duties will not resume until the church fully re-opens to members and outside groups. Sylvanda is being trained on all systems at the Cox Avenue building and the church's buildings, so will be familiar with operations at all of our owned facilities.
- Administrative Assistant Kiara Ruth's hours have been reduced from 20 to 15 per week. Kiara will be in the office 3 hours a day, usually in the mornings, assisting the staff. She will also continue to support Nancy Petty in her many responsibilities.

Communications Specialist Dana Deaton currently works 18 hours per week producing and managing church publications and email outreach, including the church's several social media platforms, and managing the church website.

Minister with Youth and their Families Bryan Lee works part-time with assistance from Dana and several volunteer members (Nathan and Henry Powers and Erich and Jack Rakestraw) to manage the livestreaming functions. Bryan troubleshoots any technical difficulties in that process.

The church's communications and Information technology needs have been studied by the Personnel Committee for several years. We believe that it is now appropriate to make some changes, expanding and improving our communications and IT efforts. Thus the functions of the Communications Specialist position have been reconfigured into a position titled Communications Director. The individual hired for this position will work 32 hours per week, consolidating the current part-time duties and expanding opportunities to better promote PMBC to its congregation and broader communities.

Both the Coordinating Council and Finance Committee have approved this reorganization of responsibilities. Funding for this newly configured Communications Director position will have minimal impact on the budget due to the consolidation and reconfiguration of other part-time staff positions.

The job announcement and description have been posted on the church web site and several external employment opportunity web sites. We hope to fill this position as soon as possible.

Music Ministry Update

Behind the Scenes of the "Commonwealth of Love" Project

This year's Pentecost service led by the Music Ministry premiered a special recording by Pullen's Chancel & Youth Choir voices. Though Music Ministry Groups recorded music during the pandemic using simple applications, this project used a more involved process to produce a video that not only includes words and music, but visual imagery and filmed footage to interpret the song and express its story-line.

The video's song, "Commonwealth of Love," is now a familiar Pullen anthem as it won our 2015 Church Music Search. We were grateful to reconnect with the anthem's composer, Chris O'Hara, who, from his home in the UK, provided us with a new arrangement and instrumental accompaniment for the recording. In addition, Chris edited the audio for the project – a lengthy process combining each individual singer's recording into one balanced choral sound. We were also delighted to have Chris add his image and voice to the project.

Following audio work, came the video editing done locally by Justin Allen, known to Pullen through his participation and work as media technician at Kirk of Kildaire, Presbyterian, Cary. Justin's video editing effectively combined with the audio to present the song's story-line.



Influenced by the anthem, the

word "commonwealth" has become a meaningful word at Pullen to reference the kind of community we wish to be. The song speaks of our building a commonwealth of justice, freedom and peace together and for all people. The anthem's music supports this idea by including an eclectic mix of middle-eastern. gospel and jazz influences. The interpretive visuals in the video begin with an image of downtown Raleigh, from Pullen's sanctuary art, and footage of busy Hillsborough Street (representing the setting where Pullen resides and from where the church moves out to build a commonwealth for all). Looking closely, one can see signs requiring masks on a passing city bus, historically noting the time of pandemic in which this video was made. Footage from the Poteat Chapel Labyrinth interprets the song's words about difficult journeys and times of searching. Images of the shining sky seen through the chapel's windows and a green tree through its open door symbolically express the text's emphasis on light, love and hope. The end of the video sweeps the viewer up from the Pullen sanctuary of worship, past the communion table and chancel fountain, dissolving through the church walls, back to busy Hillsborough Street, concluding with a view toward downtown. The combined visual imageries seek to express the connected and cyclical nature of worship and ministry as a "commonwealth" is built both within our community and beyond.

Because our congregation can freely use "Commonwealth of Love," Pullen participants, groups, councils and committees are encouraged to use the video in creative ways to enhance gatherings, various ministries and church events. It is the hope of the Pullen Music Ministry that this project helps to "tell our story" and promotes the good work of Pullen among ourselves and with others. ONE Wake is a non-partisan, multi-ethnic, multi-issue group of religious congregations, associations, and other non-profits in the Wake County area. As a member institution we commit to showing up for our neighbors especially around the issues of educational equity, living wages and affordable housing.

#### **Introducing 10,000 STRONG**

At the June 10 Annual meeting, ONE Wake member organizations ratified a 10,000 voter power strategy to get our elected officials to work to build homes that people can actually afford, form real pathways to better

jobs, and ensure equity and opportunity for all of our students. Here are some specific ways we're calling on officials around the county to make this happen.

#### Cary

•Prioritize the budget so that a penny of the Town's tax rate goes toward creating and preserving affordable housing;

#### Raleigh

- •Create a new property tax subsidy program to prevent rising property taxes from displacing low income homeowners;
- •Designate over 100 acres of city owned land for affordable housing;



#### Wendell

•Use county land in the West Town neighborhood of Wendell for affordable housing and other amenities;

#### Wake Forest

•Preserve manufactured housing through resident-owned cooperatives in Wake Forest;

#### Countywide

- •Grow the Barriers Removal Program at WakeTech to provide more cost of living scholarships for students in workforce development courses;
- •Address inequities in Wake County Public Schools relating to learning loss, teaching conditions, mental health, and access to technology.

This <u>issue agenda</u> was formed through over 3,600 grassroots conversations within our member institutions and the communities that surround them. Regardless of the timing of the next municipal election, ONE Wake is committed to holding our elected leaders accountable with the 10,000 STRONG strategy.

# The Linear Economy Vs. the Circular Economy of Waste

A Focus on One Local Company's Efforts

Increasing our impact on the health of our planet can be achieved in how we operate our homes and businesses. For example, in addition to reducing our carbon footprint through the use of sustainable energy sources, composting and where we invest our money, we can also make an impact through our shopping habits. Making choices which reduce packaging waste are one of the ways we can make a difference. Recently an article in Walter Magazine focused on this important shift in consumer habits by featuring a local company that helps individuals and companies shift to a more sustainable approach to shopping. Their approach can be described as following the circular economy of waste.



"The way that most people consume goods is the manufacturer makes something that gets sold to a store, you take it home, consume it, and then it gets thrown away, composted or recycled. That's the linear economy of waste. The circular economy is where you have the vessel or packaging for the good, you take it home and use the good, then you take it back to the manufacturer and it's used again, which promotes reuse versus disposal." Interviewed in Walter Magazine in April 2020, Alyssa Cherry, founder of Fillaree, a Durham company specializing in sustainable soaps and cleaning products, describes her company mission and operational approach. "It's about feeling empowered and having control over the impact that you're making on the environment and the planet. While we can do a lot of things to reduce our carbon footprint, like reusable coffee cups and bags, when it comes to other consumables like food, body care, personal care and household items, it's difficult to consume in a way you feel good about. That's why refillable soap is so important. Plastic pollution is a huge problem— China has stopped taking all of our imported recycled plastics—and we all need soap, especially these days! We all need to be washing our hands to keep our bodies healthy and families safe. But you don't always need to buy a new container every time." "Subscribers to the refill program receive a 32 ounce vessel of liquid soap, refill their containers, then send it back to Fillaree in a prepaid envelope where it's washed, sanitized and refilled, and then shipped off to its next destination." Customers can subscribe or not and also purchase and refill their products at the Durham store. Many of the products are also sold in Raleigh at The Zen Succulent, at Green 4 Life in Cary, the Durham Food Co-op and at many other locations.


# Housing All Peer Advocates Needed!

In October of 2020 the **Housing All** fund began as a collaborative partnership between First Baptist and Pullen Memorial Baptist Churches. Both congregations were independently helping their neighbors in need with rental and utility assistance. However, the sheer volume of those needing assistance was too much for the churches to shoulder independently. We hope that this fund can grow to be a multi-church, inter-faith effort, with congregations partnering together across Wake County. We believe that we can do more together than we can apart.

To help us meet our goal of keeping families together in their homes, we need volunteers as peer advocate support. Peer Advocates are responsible for answering voice mail, assisting with financial request intake, and providing accessible resources to people seeking help.

We will be holding several **Housing All volunteer** trainings in July. You need to attend only one training session. Trainings will be held in the Pullen church library from 1:30-3 pm on the following Mondays:
